OUR OUTDOORS

On A Break

Dragging my jig over the subtle pull of the shifting river bottom, I felt a dead weight sensation and lifted the rod tip to see the slight bend confirm what my cold and glove-covered hands could barely detect.

I completed the raise with all due haste and the point of the hook on my parrotcolored jig found its place in the upper jaw of the walleye at the other end. Soon the splashing, flipping goldensided fish made its way to the net under the gray earlyafternoon skies like the one a few minutes before it. I knew my buddy Kevin and I were on a good set of fish.

It was a solid trade to wipe the cold water of the Missouri River from my hands to drop the 16-incher into the livewell before blowing a breath through them, drying them off on my pant leg and rebaiting.

It's been a tale of two springs thus far into the openwater season, with March warm and sunny, and April being cold and windy with more snow in the last two weeks than we saw in the month prior and likely in some spots, back into January.

I often find myself lamenting the shift and strangely asking for the conditions from early spring instead of what we're finding now. The fast-forward motion has suddenly stalled with running fish seemingly reversing course or at least holding still in little places like the breakline in the side channel of the river where we were finding them.

While normally I'd be chasing spawning bass on the powerplant lake to the north or flipping a fly for holdover trout in a handful of select nearby reservoirs, the walleyes were a welcome break. They provided a new learning experience on a water I longed more and more to know better with each hookset.

"I've always said walleyes are easy to catch," Kevin advised of our situation while bringing up another one. "It's finding them that's hard."

After a couple of stops in similar side channels, the curl between the fastest stretch in the side water — which was about a cast or two wide at best, but an amazing 22 feet deep in the middle — was the place where we found them.

The challenge, after locating the fish, was setting the hook. We likely booted as many walleyes as we boated, as cold fingers and attention span distracted by sleet, rain and wind cut into the quickness in which we loaded the livewell.

But a pattern emerged for me, and I reported it to my friend. Each time my jig came up out of the depths, about two-thirds of a cast length behind the boat, it stuck on a small rise in the river's silty bottom before popping loose and scooting along the edge of the flat. There on the breakline the walleyes waited, and more often than not, I felt the dead weight sensation, a slight tap, or that not-quiteright feeling of a fish on the other end.

While it took some time to factor the slight disturbance

in the methodical retrieve, it all came together as my second-to-last fish went in the livewell and we decided to troll our way home. We first started on the upper edge of the side channel, where my friend caught and released a larger female walleye, before I closed out the day with a final keeper.

While spring may have suddenly stopped in recent days and cold temperatures and wintery mixes of rain, sleet and snow fill the air, the pause certainly produced great fishing despite the conditions. Having found what we were looking for on the break in the fork of the river where the walleyes had paused for at least an afternoon was a welcome consolation and well worth the cool down ... in our outdoors.

PRAIRIE FARE

I heard Carl singing in our backyard, so I went outside to investigate.

He was sitting high in a tree, singing more loudly than ever. Carl is decked out in bright

red with a black mask, so he is easy to spot. His slightly drab-looking partner, Cora, swooped in and

landed in a nearby tree.
Yes, I name my favorite
wildlife. Carl and Cora are the
cardinal pair I enjoy observing.
They have a very unique

birdcall.

I am hoping they expand their family with a flock of young cardinals. We keep their feeding station filled with their favorite seeds.

Nearby, two robins were working on a nest. I am hoping that "Mother Robin" is not quite as aggressive this year.

She dive bombed my head every time I went to my garden last year. I guess my weeding was a threat. Finally, her fledglings left the cozy nest and flew along into adulthood.

I feel a little like Mother Robin this spring. My youngest child will graduate and leave for college. As a mother, I feel a little protective of my children.

Although I am not a procrastinator typically, I find myself delaying sending out invitations to her graduation party. Soon, she will fly away from home. Life progresses quickly.

Perhaps I am procrastinating a bit. I have a monumental amount of things to do before inviting a lot of people to our home and backyard for a buffet.

I will be my own caterer. The last thing I want to do is have a truly memorable event for all the wrong reasons. I certainly do not want anyone to become ill.

Many people occasionally cook for a crowd. To get all of

you readers thinking, I have questions and scenarios for you to ponder. The answers are at the end.

1. Name at least five foodhandling issues associated with foodborne illness.

2. At what temperature should your refrigerator maintain food?

3. At what temperature should your freezer be set?

4. You decide to do a brunch for a graduation party and breakfast casserole is on the menu. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, to what internal temperature should an egg casserole reach?

5. You are having an outdoor picnic party. The day warms to 90 F. How long is perishable food, including cut fruit and meat-containing sandwiches, safe?

6. You decide to do a backyard barbecue for a party. To what temperature should beef burgers be cooked?

7. To what internal temperature should ground turkey or chicken be cooked?

8. At what temperature should fully cooked, perishable food be maintained?

Here are the answers.

1. Frequent issues associated with foodborne illness outbreaks include the following: failure to cool food properly, food not hot enough, infected food handlers, preparation a day or more ahead of time, food left in the danger zone (41 to 140 F) too long, leftover food not reheated high enough and cross-contamination.

2. Your refrigerator should be set at 40 F or lower.

3. Your freezer should be set at 0 F or lower.

4. Cook egg casseroles to 160 F.

5. At warm temperatures above 90 F, perishable food is safe for an hour. Be sure to serve perishable cold food nested over bowls of ice. Keep hot foods hot in slow cookers or other heating devices.

6. Cook ground beef patties

to 160 F.

7. Cook ground turkey or chicken patties to 165 F.

8. Keep hot foods hot – at 140 F or higher.

As you can see, temperature is a key to safety, as are basic hygiene, including handwashing, and other food safety principles.

1 c. plain, nonfat Greek yogurt

1/4 c. mayonnaise

CHOCOLATE PEANUT BUTTER BANANA STUFFED FRENCH TOAST

Ingredients

4 slices Texas toast (I prefer Texas toast over regular bread because it's thicker)

about 8 tablespoons chocolate peanut butter, divided (Nutella may be substituted)

- 1 medium banana, sliced into thin rounds
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup milk (I used unsweetened cashew milk)
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- about 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, for griddling

Directions:

Spread each slice of bread with about 2 tablespoons chocolate peanut butter.

Evenly add bananas to two of the slices in an even, flat layer.

Top with remaining bread slices (with the chocolate peanut butter side down, touching the bananas); set the 2 sandwiches aside.

To a medium bowl, add the eggs, milk, sugar, cinnamon, and whisk to combine; set aside.

To a large skillet, add the butter and heat over mediumhigh heat to melt. After butter has melted, dip each sandwich in the egg mixture, on both sides, and place sandwiches in skillet.

Cook for about 3 to 4 minutes per side, or until lightly golden browned on both sides. Slice and serve immediately. French toast is best warm and fresh.

AVOCADO BAGEL SANDWICH

Ingredients

1 sourdough bagel, sliced in half and toasted

- 1 avocado, mashed
- 2 tablespoons coconut yogurt
- 1 small cucumber, sliced
- 1 radish, sliced
- Flax seeds
- Hemp seeds
- Chili flakes
- Sesame seeds
- Pumpkin seeds

Directions:

Spread avocado onto half of the bagel. Top with coconut yogurt, cucumber slices, radish slices, and a sprinkle of each remaining ingredient.

Top the filled bagel half with the remaining side of the toasted bagel.


