Xtra | 10.4.21 | 3 Carrots: Good for Eyes, Skin and More **PRAIRIE FARE**

Whenever I see carrots, I think of a friend of mine. I was a graduate student and she was a technician.

Back in those days, you could smoke cigarettes in the hallways and offices on campus. During breaks, she would smoke cigarettes, and we'd visit in the hallway. I think I breathed a fair amount of secondhand smoke.

Fortunately for her (and me), she decided to quit smoking. She ate a carrot every time she felt the urge to smoke. Eating carrots helped keep her hands and mouth busy. I think we nicknamed her "Bugs Bunny" because she often had a carrot with the green tops attached.

I estimate she ate at least 10 full-size carrots at work and probably more at home. I certainly promote eating more vegetables, but this was carrotoverload.

Before too long, we all noticed the palms of her hands were orange. Soon, her face and arms took on an orangecolored hue.

The condition is called "carotenemia," a skin discoloration that can develop after a few weeks of robust eating of beta-carotene rich foods. Beta-carotene is the pigment found in carrots, pumpkin, squash, sweet potatoes and other vegetables and fruits.

Sometimes infants can turn an orangey color if they are fed too much beta-carotene foods.

The good news is that carotenemia is not dangerous and will resolve itself when "Bugs Bunny" switches to eating a more balanced, varied diet. My friend switched to chewing gum instead of chomping on carrots, and her skin returned to its usual color.

Carrots are nutritious and popular. They are the sixth most popularly consumed vegetable in the U.S. according to the Agricultural Marketing Service. One medium-sized carrot (about 7 inches) has 35 calories and 2 grams (g) fiber, including the type of fiber that may help maintain a healthful blood cholesterol level.

of beta-carotene, which the human body converts to vitamin A, which promotes healthy skin and eyes. Vitamin A helps prevent a condition called "night blindness." If you experience difficulty seeing at night, discuss this with your healthcare provider.

Enjoying plenty of betacarotene-rich foods certainly won't hurt you. Most of us shortchange ourselves on darkorange fruits and vegetables.

I find harvesting carrots to be a fun activity, especially if I plant multicolored carrots. What's under that foliage? Purple and red carrots are high in anthocyanin, a pigment that acts as a cancer-fighting antioxidant.

After harvesting, cut about half of an inch from the top of each carrot, removing the greens. Growing up, we raised a lot of carrots and simply removed the excess soil, trimmed the tops and kept them bagged in an extra refrigerator. We had fresh carrots available until springtime.

If you raise small amounts of carrots, cut off the tops, rinse and air-dry them for storage in an air-tight plastic bag in the refrigerator to maintain proper humidity. If the carrots are not in air-tight bags, they may go limp in the refrigerator. Carrots will maintain their freshness longer at or around 32 F.

Carrots are readily available in grocery stores all year. "Baby cut carrots" were introduced in 1986 and result from trimming larger carrots into uniform small carrots. We see them on appetizer trays and in lunch boxes.

We often call the bags of small carrots "baby carrots," but technically, "baby carrots" are immature carrots.

Carrots can be cooked in the oven, microwave, on the stove top or in a slow cooker.

Cut larger carrots into strips or smaller coin shapes depending on the cooking plan. Toss carrots in olive oil, salt, pepper and other seasonings for added flavor. Garlic, balsamic vinegar, butter, brown sugar, honey, maple syrup, lemon

zest, chives, green onions and chili powder are good accompaniments to carrots.

Carrots can be preserved by freezing, pressure-canning, pickling or dehydrating.

How about trying a fallinspired dinner featuring roasted carrots, meatloaf and baked potatoes? This recipe features "baby carrots," and now you know the rest of the story.

Roasted Dill Carrots

36 baby carrots

2 tablespoons canola oil or olive oil

1/4 teaspoon salt (or less, to taste)

1/2 teaspoon black pepper (or to taste)

2 tablespoons minced fresh dill (or about 2 teaspoons dried)

Preheat oven to 400 F. Cut baby carrots diagonally. Toss carrots in oil. Season with salt and pepper as desired; toss again. Use sheet pan with parchment paper and transfer carrots in one layer. Roast in oven for one hour or until browned, stirring occasionally. Toss carrots with dill after roasting.

Makes four servings. Each serving has 90 calories, 7 g fat, 8 g carbohydrate, 1 g protein, 3 g fiber and 220 milligrams sodium.



Bicycles and Bloomers DAKOTA DATEBOOK

October 4, 2021 — In 1895, the New York Tribune reported the bicycle was "of more importance to mankind than all the victories and defeats of Napoleon, with the First and Second Punic Wars... thrown in." A hundred years later, the Minnesota Historical Society published an article by Bemidji professor Ron Spreng titled: The 1890s Bicycling Craze in the Red River Valley. Spreng's research revealed many surprises; for example, who would have thought it was bicycle mania that led to the "first concerted movement for improved roads?"

The country's first cycle, which appeared around 1870, was the "velocipede," a 150-pound, hand-forged contraption with wooden wheels and solid tires. Six years later, an "ordinary" cycle was displayed at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition - it was Englishmade, with a front wheel up to five feet in diameter, with a little trailer wheel to stabilize the ride. The high front wheel made for a fast ride, but unfortunately, it also often led to the dreaded "face in the dirt." Within a decade, a "safety" bicycle was introduced, using front and rear wheels of the same size, and soon after, inflatable pneumatic tires ended the safety's jarring, boneclattering ride.

Clever illustrated ads for the Svensgaard Bicycle Company in Fergus Falls

Dakota Datebook written helped launch a cycling craze much less display them." in the Red River Valley in 1892. An economic depression the following year saw the bicycle quickly fall out of favor, but by the summer of 1894, valley residents were once more enjoying activities like lawn tennis, croquet, baseball and cycling.

The Grand Forks Cycle and Pleasure Club took 10to 12-mile evening outings "under the captaincy of Mr. Dressen" that resembled military formations. It wasn't long, though, before cycling took a scandalous turn ladies starting riding without "escorts of the sterner sex."

There were about 300 cyclists in Grand Forks by the spring of 1895 – by the end of the summer, that count rose to 500. Businesses stopped referring to bikes as safeties and started calling them "wheels." Newspapers printed cycling news almost every day during the summer. Cycling clubs quickly sprang up in St. Thomas, Forest River, Jamestown, Fargo, Drayton, Larimore, Minto, Towner, Hillsboro, Neche, Pembina, Dickinson, Church's Ferry, Park River, Grafton, Gilby, Epworth, Lakota, and Buffalo.

A major topic of discussion concerned the "new woman." Women finally had a practical reason to wear bloomers (or pantaloons). Bloomers were initially worn under skirts when they were invented, but they created an almost hysterical response in 1852, because "most ladies would not admit they had legs,

Forty years later, women found they couldn't ride their cycles without admitting they had legs. Soon, they defiantly shed their corsets and petticoats and embraced baggy trousers for riding. Of course, the unthinkable became inevitable; women started wearing pantaloons even when they weren't riding! Others shortened their skirts.

Preachers began proclaiming bicycles were 'diabolical devices of the demon of darkness," and some threatened to excommunicate members who used wheels. Others said the sport was a symbol of human progress and that cycles could be used to carry the gospel to the lost.

Some pastors were fired for riding, but in the Red River Valley at least two ministers took to the road. Reverend Longfellow wheeled to Grand Forks "by the bike route" after delivering a lecture in a Detroit Lakes summer assembly, and Reverend A. T. Foster completed a 100-mile "century" ride from Casselton to Grand Forks.

Now is the Time to Kill Weeds in Lawns DAKOTA GARDENER

Killing weeds with poisonous herbicides requires us to balance the benefits and risks.

Everybody wants an attractive and weed-free lawn, but nobody wants to expose themselves to toxic chemicals.

Start by having realistic expectations about your lawn. It is not natural and practically impossible to have a lawn without any weeds.

Next, use poisonous herbicides only when they are necessary and effective.

That said, now is the most effective time to kill weeds in lawns

Timing is critical. The secret to killing perennial weeds such as dandelions and thistles is to get the herbicide down into their roots.

The root systems of some weeds are extensive. One Canadian thistle plant, for example, can grow 300 feet of roots in one summer!

It is a challenge to get herbicide into a vast network of roots, and that is why now is the best time.

The nights are getting longer and the weeds in your lawn know winter is coming. In response, these weeds are beginning to channel their sugars down into their roots to store them over winter.

That is perfect for us. If we spray a weed with a systemic herbicide in fall, the weed will accidentally channel it along with its sugars down into its roots. Gotcha!

A spray done once per yearnow in fall—can control most broadleaf weeds and minimize our exposure to poisonous chemicals.

For most situations this seems like a good balance of benefits and risks.

Another sensible strategy is to spot-spray in weedy areas rather than spraying the entire yard. This will reduce the exposure of us and our landscape plants to herbicides.

Trimec formulations are commonly available and work well. These products contain a blend of 2,4-D; mecoprop (MCPP) and dicamba. Some of these formulations contain quinclorac as well.

Follow the instructions on the label. Mix at the proper rate. Avoid using higher than recommended rates because this may harm nearby landscape plants.

Wear protective clothing when spraying poisonous chemicals. Protect yourself by wearing a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, socks, and nonabsorbent gloves and shoes. Additional recommendations may be listed on the label.

To prevent herbicide drift, do not spray when the temperature is in the high 80s or higher. Spray when winds are calm and use heavy droplets rather than fine mists.

Keep children and pets off the lawn at least until the herbicide dries. The label may list longer waiting times.

Other cultural practices can reduce our need for herbicides. Mow your turf tall, let grass clippings fall to the soil and fertilize your lawn. These practices can create a thick turf that smothers emerging weeds.

If you are going to spray herbicides to kill weeds in your lawn, make it count.

Do it safely. Do it now.


