

Mixed Walleyes Staying Shallow

THE PELUSO REPORT

I know our open water days are limited. The long-range forecast does have a couple nice days in there, but it's definitely turning colder and my brain is slowly shifting to the hard water season.

The walleyes are still biting on the Missouri River, however. It seems the fish are really mixed together as far as size goes. Early this week we saw lots of small walleyes showing up. It was crazy to fish certain areas and catch a 12 incher one drift and a 22 incher the next. It did seem that as the day warmed up, the fishing and the

size of fish would get better.

No secret here, we fished Northland 1/4-ounce jigs with no bodies and a threaded-on minnow. Yellow with a red eye seemed to outfish every other jig we put down and the fish are still relatively shallow. Three to 10 feet of water behind sandbars is holding most of the walleyes. Guys are pulling cranks on the outsides of the sandbars and catching a lot of fish.

I'm hoping to get out a few more times yet as the weather permits. I am working hard off the water booking ice fishing trips and getting all my ice fishing equipment put together. Lots of work to do to be ready, but I love every minute of it. We are also gearing up for the darkhouse spearing on Sakakawea. I have all that information on my website www.mikepelusooutdoors.

If you are thinking of joining me this winter on the ice get a hold of me so we can pencil you in. We can handle groups of any size! Devils Lake should be fantastic this coming winter season!

Growing Apples for Cider

DAKOTA GARDENER

Have you ever drank a mug of farm-fresh cider? It's absolutely delicious! Homegrown apple cider is much richer and more flavorful than what you can buy at the grocery store.

I was raised on an apple farm in Minnesota. Every fall we would crush our small apples in a cider press to make jugs of cider to share with friends. Our arms would be weary after cranking the machine for hours, but it was worth it.

Nothing tasted better on a cold day in winter.

After sliding down snowy hills or shoveling snow as a boy, I can recall the aroma of hot cider in the kitchen. The warm mug would comfort my frozen fingers.

Add a cinnamon stick to your mug, and you are in heaven!

You can grow your own cider (sweet or hard). It's one of the most popular trends in fruitgrowing today.

Cider apple trees may be ordered now from fruit nurseries. You buy them as bareroot trees that will be shipped next spring. A sampling of nurseries includes Cummins, Fedco, Grandpa's Orchard, Maple Valley, Raintree, Stark Bros. and St. Lawrence.

Now is the time to take action. Cider trees are in great demand and some varieties have already sold out for planting next spring.

Know your Hardiness Zone (3 or 4). The northern quarter of our state is in Zone 3. This includes land north of Williston, Minot and Grafton. The remainder of the state is in "balmy" Zone 4.

Almost any variety of apple will make delicious apple cider, but some varieties will make an exceptional beverage.

Russet varieties are famous for making the finest cider. These rough-skinned apples have sweet and intense flavors. The hardiest russet is Minnesota 1734.

Other good cidermakers for Zone 3 include Whitney crabapple, Chestnut crabapple and Frostbite apple. Frostbite is a grandfather of Honeycrisp.

Gardeners in Zone 4 have additional options. Golden Russet has been called the "champagne" of ciders. Redfield has red flesh that

sampling of nurseries includes will make your cider turn blood Cummins, Fedco, Grandpa's red, Wow!

Ashmead's Kernel is famous for its pear-like flavor and rich aroma. Liberty resists diseases and is easy to grow. Cortland, Yarlington Mill and Fameuse will make great cider.

Besides selecting the variety, you need to consider the rootstock your tree will grow on. "Standard" rootstocks are usually used in Zone 3. These trees are very hardy, grow vigorously and will require lots of pruning to keep at a manageable height.

Semi-dwarf rootstocks are often used in Zone 4 because they bear crops earlier, grow shorter, and are easier to manage.

Small-scale fruit grinders and presses are available to process the apples.

If you have room for a cider tree in your back yard, I encourage you to plant one. It will fill your home with warmth and wonderful memories.



The womb of time

I decided to slip out of work early Friday and hunt the opener. I knew that there would be a fair number of hunters who had the same idea, but I thought the little tract of PLOTS where I had hunted last year would be unoccupied—boy was I wrong.

When I arrived, I was met with three trucks at the entrance and another on the backside. I rolled down my window, told them I'd head elsewhere and wished them luck. I was disappointed that "my spot" was not the hidden gem I thought it was, but I moved on to the next PLOTS area I had scouted briefly during archery season. One half-hour drive later I pulled up at the same time as another truck.

The other truck had three hunters in it, the youngest a teenage girl, her dad and grandpa. You could see the disappointment on their faces that I was parked at their hunting area. I chatted with them and found out that the young girl had her first buck tag. I told them they could hunt the area and where I had found deer signs when I walked it earlier in the year. I wished them luck as I took off.

The encounter reminded me of a story from the late author and conservationist, Jim "Poz" Posewitz. The first time I met Jim he was already in his 80s. We were at a brewery in Helena and over a couple of beers he told me stories of fighting the effort to dam the Yellowstone River, of Roosevelt creating the national forests, and how growing up in the 1930s you'd sprint home and tell your parents if you cut a deer track in the woods.

The story that jogged in my memory after seeing the girl, her dad and grandpa taking to the field was of Jim hunting on some national forest land outside of Helena. As "Poz" told it; right before daylight, a father hunting with his two sons, looking like "poster boys for a hunter education," walked up the trail behind Jim.

The dad approached and said he didn't want to get in front of Jim, who was methodically making his way up the trail. At that moment, a quote from Teddy Roosevelt came into Poz's head: "We do these things for the generations within the Womb of Time." Jim told them to go ahead. Jim reminisced to me, that "there were three generations on that mountain all participating in the pursuit of a restored deer population."

As I drove on and thought of Poz and his stories, I found a section of state land that looked promising and didn't have a truck at every corner. I parked and walked the edge of the property until the 20-mph wind was in my face, then worked up to a knob and glassed, picking a part the landscape.

It only took minutes, before a group of mule deer slowly grazing down into a little depression 600 yards away caught my attention. Their movement a dead giveaway, I quickly scanned for a buck in the group. There was a small 1x2 antlered buck trailing behind. I quickly backed out of the area and circled behind the small butte, 15 minutes later I had cut the distance by over half, still undetected and went to get settled into the hillside.

That's when the bigger buck caught my eve. Bedded down behind some brush, I had missed him in my initial glassing. A big bodied 4x4 mule, confidently bedded watching over his harem of does. I used my range finder to get a quick read of the buck - 246 yards. I set my backpack on a rock outcropping to use as a rest. I steadied by Tikka rifle and took a couple of deep breaths to get my heart rate in check. My gun rang out, breaking the silence in the area.

As I marveled at his dark antlers and his thick rut induced neck, my mind went back to my old friend Poz and his story of the dad and two kids on the mountain and all the future generations still in the Womb of Time. I hope they too, can experience the same opportunity and robust game populations that we do today.

Figure Four, Famous Rodeo Horse

DAKOTA DATEBOOK

Dakota Datebook written by Cathy A. Langemo

December 1, 2021 — Figure Four was a famous North Dakota rodeo bucking horse that performed at the National Finals Rodeo during the 1960s.

Born in the late 1940s on the Figure Four Ranch about 30 miles northwest of Killdeer, he was bred by ranch owner Vic Christensen. He was born to a gentle saddle mare owned by an aunt of the Christensen children, and the sire was unknown

Vic sold the yearling to Nick Fettig of Killdeer in the early 1950s, where Figure Four became part of the rodeo operation. Nick then sold him to Phil Fettig. When Phil died in 1960, the Figure Four ownership transferred to Jack

A steel-gray gelding standing nearly 16 hands and weighing about 1,300 pounds, Figure Four had a good temperament and was easy to handle. According to LeRoy Fettig, of Dickinson, he was a smart, cunning and proud-acting horse. Figure Four loved to buck and was very athletic—jumping high and bucking hard.

Figure Four's first time out of the bucking chute was as a three year old in the fall of 1952 at the Killdeer Mountain Rodeo Arena. North Dakota rodeo star Duane Howard, who was at that time a young rough stock hand, was on Figure Four's back for his debut.

Perhaps his most famous performance was at the 1956 Dickinson Match of Champions before a capacity crowd. Sixtime World Champion saddle bronc rider Casey Tibbs drew him for the final round ride.

Casey rode him that day, but it is still in question whether he made the whistle. He split first/second with North Dakota cowboy Joe Chase.

The next year, in 1999, Joe Chase rode Figure Four at the Match of Champions. Chase also drew him at the Minot Y's Men's Indoor Rodeo.

Figure Four bucked for 20 years at professional rodeos throughout the Dakotas and Montana. Top bareback and saddle bronc riders either won top prize money on him or were bucked to the ground before the

 $He\,was\,named\,the\,top\,saddle$ bronc at Deadwood, South

Dakota, in the late 1950s and early 1960s and was selected for the 1959 National Finals Rodeo.

Figure Four returned to the NFR three more years—in 1961 and 1962 in saddle bronc and, in 1964, in bareback.

From 1964 to 1966, Figure Four was used only in bareback riding, with his final performance in 1966. For those fortunate enough to see him in action, he left many people with exciting rodeo memories.

Figure Four was still owned by Jack Fettig when he died on his home ground in the Little Missouri Badlands in the late 1960s. He was about 22 years

Is there anything better for a kid than knowing if they are going to go to the dance on Friday night, there are chores that need done first, and there will be chores that need done at daylight on Saturday? I

know there are millions of people out there that don't have that opportunity. But it always seems to me, that as a rural parent, we have a little advantage that makes our job a little easier. I think most people in the Dakotas have that advantage.

Shirley was at a meeting with one of the commanders of a unit from North Dakota that had been in Iraq. This was some time ago. The question was asked "if the troops had the supplies and armament that they needed?" The soldier thought a minute and replied that they didn't, but he had a bunch of boys from North Dakota that could pull a truck into the motor pool and with a welder and some scrap iron improvise. I'm glad they can help. But I wish they were

We have a lot to be thankful for. Oh, there are always problems. There is drought and war and sickness. There will be loss of loved ones and those that can't make it to dinner.

But, when you get up in the morning, and watch that sun coming up in the east. And you know that next year is going to be a good crop year. And you are surrounded by kids and grandkids, take the time to be thankful. And say a prayer for those that can't be at the table this week.



PUMPKIN PIE CINNAMON ROLL CASSEROLE

By OMGChocolateDesserts

Ingredients

12oz. can refrigerated Cinnamon Rolls with Icing

For pumpkin pie filling:

- 1 ³/₄ cup (1–15 oz. can) pumpkin puree
- 1 ¼ cup evaporated milk
- 2 large (or 3 small) eggs slightly beaten
- ³/₄ cup light brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 ½ teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

Pecan streusel topping:

- ½ cup + 1 Tbsp. light brown sugar
- ½ cup+ 1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 4 Tbsp. butter-melted and cooled
- ½ cup pecans-chopped (reserve a few pecan halves for garnish on top)

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 F. Grease 7 x 11 inch glass or ceramic dish with non-stick spray.

To make the topping, in a bowl stir together the flour, sugar and pecans. Then, add melted butter and stir with the fork until all evenly moistened and created pea size crumbs. Set in the fridge until ready to use.

Now make the filling. In a bowl combine all filing ingredients and whisk well until smooth and evenly combined, set aside.

Open the tube of refrigerated cinnamon rolls and separate the rolls on lightly floured working surface. Cut each roll in small ½ inch pieces. Arrange the pieces in single layer to cover the bottom of greased casserole.

Pour the filling over the cinnamon roll layer. Sprinkle half of the streusel on top and reserve remaining mixture for

Bake for 25-30 minutes, until it rise and form a slightly firmed layer on top. At that point take it out from the oven, sprinkle remaining streusel and arrange a few pecan halves on top for garnish. Bake for 10-15 minutes more, until the knife inserted in the center comes out wet but clean. Do not overbake(complete baking time should be about 40-45minutes)

Cool about 25 minutes before drizzle the icing.




