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Would You Plant a Bee Lawn?

When I was growing up, my father wanted to have the perfect, weed-free lawn. I remember him spending hours mowing, fertilizing and spraying 2,4-D.

The lawn was good enough to win the local newspaper's yard of the week competition. However, my father was never successful in eradicating the white clover in our backyard. I was fascinated by the bumble bees that visited the white blossoms.

Fast forward to 2022. In the years since my childhood, the turf industry has developed more effective lawn herbicides for residential yards. In my neighborhood, I can't think of a single lawn that has white clover. While the lawns are all perfectly green, there is something missing—bees. We've been conditioned by

lawn companies to think that a healthy lawn is synonymous with a solid green carpet. In reality, a green monoculture is like a desert for our pollinators. Pollinators need flowers that produce nectar and pollen to survive. Our bee populations have been shrinking because there are fewer flowers in

What we do in our yard matters by virtue of the large area that lawns occupy. Turfgrass is the single largest irrigated crop in the United States. Collectively, Americans grow enough turfgrass to equal the land area of Texas. This area is just slightly less than U.S. wheat acreage.

Turfgrass researchers are now advocating that homeowners plant special bee lawns to provide pollinator habitat. These are special turfgrass mixtures that contain fine fescues and short-growing flowering species like white clover that will provide nectar and pollen for pollinators. For example, the University of Minnesota is recommending the incorporation of white clover, creeping thyme and self-heal into turfgrass.

The psychological barriers to planting a bee lawn can be daunting even in a horticulturist's household. When I mentioned planting a bee lawn, my husband was hesitant. What will the neighbors think? Will the clover make the lawn look unkempt? Will we still be able to spray herbicide to keep the dandelions under control?

Many individuals will have concerns and questions.

That's why North Dakota State University is trialing bee lawns in the Horticultural Research and Demonstration Garden on campus. Three separate bee lawn mixes were sowed last summer and will be available for the public to visit this summer along with other turfgrass plots.

I am going to trial a small patch of bee lawn in our backyard. If you are hesitant like my husband, the key is to start small. We are going to plant a 100 square foot patch and evaluate how it does.

We like our neighbors and will communicate our objectives to them. If one of our neighbors has a bee allergy, we will be considerate. One of our neighbors really does prize the perfect green lawn. Therefore, it would probably be better to locate our bee lawn on the other side of our yard.

Bee lawns are a major paradigm shift. We'll start small and be respectful of our neighbors.

Dakota Datebook written by six days later. Christina Campbell

February 11, 2022 — In 1861, Dakota Territory included portions of present-day Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. As each region became separate territories, it appeared that the borders of the three future states failed to join, leaving a triangular section between Montana, Wyoming and Idaho that still belonged to the Territory of Dakota.

Land office maps from the 1860's marked this area as almost 100 miles wide and 35 miles deep. On this day, February 11, 1873, the United States Senate approved HR Bill No. 2593 adjoining this triangular remnant of Dakota Territory to Montana. President Grant signed the bill

Soon after, a partial survey of the area revealed that such an extensive area could not have existed. In the end, Montana acquired an area a mere four miles long and two miles deep where it touches Wyoming's northwest corner. Most of the area lies within the boundaries of Yellowstone National Park.

A heightened wind gust flapped at the canvas of my flipover shack as my youngest son, Jackson, sat next to me sounding out the longer words in his brother's book which I had tucked into the pocket of my ice fishing jacket and provided to him after our run of fishing had quieted down some and the

in between doldrums settled in. My older son, AJ, had found a spot between my brother and my buddy helping to reel in the last flurry of perch that had rolled through as the northwest wind peaked in the middle of the final Saturday of January. Waiting on one more school to move in, I nervously watched the screen of my sonar hoping that our shortening window of time would provide one more blast of action.

Helping Jackson through longer words like "noticed" and "promised" on the brightly colored pages of the hardcover comic book about a policeman dog and an artist cat and dozens of other animal characters, I listened as he handled most of the other words with relative ease, sounding them out when needed.

Meanwhile, my older boy requested a playlist from his uncle, and soon the biggest pop hits of the 2010s were playing in the adjacent canvas flipover, just audible over the rushing wind and the whipping fabric. He had found his spot in the neighboring shack, thanks to a solid run of black-striped fish and the urgent call for his help stemming from the suggested inability of the two well-seasoned adult anglers to manage all of the incredible action going on in the house, with bobbers popping and their jigging rods already doubled

The sense of his importance in the moment was not lost on him as he shouted his tally and its upward trend as a few singleton perch roamed through the area and he continued to uphold his reeling duties on the bobber rods. The ages of eight and five certainly help build sibling rivalry, and suddenly - in addition to height, speed, distance jumped and how high one can count — the number of fish in a bucket became a brotherly measuring stick.

Traded elbows, near contact (but not actual contact) with index fingers and ratcheted-up namecalling led to competition in the blowing snow outside the shack to see who could move more slush with an ice scoop. All those however changed with an invite of one kid into one shack, and the other joining my team as we hunkered over our holes and set our hooks. That help from my two most regular fishing buddies would have made the day a success in itself, but the fun continued as the zoomed-in side of my Vexilar screen turned red and pink when a new cloud of fish moved in.

'The wall is back," I shouted

as our bobbers disappeared and my jigging rod bent with a nonetoo-subtle strike. Jackson was bringing up his biggest fish of the day as my float went below the bottom of the ice. I grabbed it and handed it to him as soon as he was done with the first one and he reeled in a matching fish as I landed a slightly smaller one. AJ's shouts of excitement could be heard as well through the wind tunnel between our shacks as a sizeable group of fish settled in.

By the end of it, six jumbos were stacked to my right on the inside of the sled, and we had released at least that many more in the blur of bobbers, rebaiting and shouts of growing totals that rivaled Gimli and Legolas at the Battle of Helm's Deep.

After the final round of excitement, I managed one more fish and as AJ came over to confirm his brother's count was accurate, I handed him the perch, requesting that he add it to the bucket. "Okay, but this counts as another one for me," he bargained, explaining that technically he was the one who was putting it in the pail. With a laugh, we began to wrap up our day on the ice, many hands making for lighter work as we packed up and daisychained our sled houses and my brother towed us back on his snowmobile to the access point on the prairie lake.

It was a team effort filled with fun fishing, memories made, and ongoing contests that will continue into the future, made possible through the helping hands of good friends ... in our outdoors.



BROWNIE SNICKERS OVERNIGHT OATS

Ingredients

- 1/2 banana (or 40 g yogurt)
- 1/2 c rolled oats
- 1 tbsp maple syrup/ sweetener
- 1 tbsp cocoa powder
- 1 tbsp peanut butter
- pinch salt
- 1/2 c nondairy milk
- 1/2 tbsp peanut butter (topping)
- 1 tbsp chocolate chips

Directions

Combine in a bowl mashed banana (or yogurt) with the oats, maple syrup (or sweetener of choice), cocoa powder, nut butter, pinch of salt. Add nondairy milk and stir to combine.

Refrigerate for at least 3 hours or overnight. Serve with peanut butter and chocolate chips.

SALTED TAHINI CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp fine salt
- 1 stick unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup tahini
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup semi-sweet or dark chocolate chunks thick sea salt

Directions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking soda, and fine salt. Set aside.

In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment, beat the butter and brown sugar on medium-high speed until pale and fluffy. Add tahini, egg, and vanilla and beat until incorporated. Reduce speed to low and add in the dry ingredients beating until combined. Use a spatula to fold in the chocolate.

Use a 1-inch scoop to scoop out dough into balls onto prepared baking sheet, keeping 2 inches between each cookie. Repeat with the rest of the dough and then sprinkle thick sea salt over the cookies.

If baking right away, transfer to preheated oven and bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until brown around the edges. Let cool on pan for 10 minutes and then serve.

Alternatively, transfer dough balls into the freezer for one hour and then transfer all the dough into a freezer bag, seal, and store in the freezer for up to 3 months. When wanting one, just bake at 375 for 15 to 18 minutes.

Try These Tips to Avoid Winter Dehydration

PRAIRIE FARE

I was getting a little worried. I could not hear the grumbling sound of the snow blower.

Our driveway and sidewalks were covered with a mountain of snow that drifted in after the latest blizzard.

I poked my head out the front door to check on my husband. He had been outside for more than two hours clearing snow in subzero temperatures.

"Are you OK?" I asked.

"I am almost done out here," he replied as he leaned on a shovel.

His scarf, stocking hat and hair were frozen, and his clothes were covered in snow. He looked like a snow man, or maybe an ice man.

"The driveway and sidewalk are good enough," I announced. "Come inside and warm up."

When I saw my frozen

husband, I felt guilty about basking in the warmth of our home. I should have "suited up" in all my winter gear and belied

I was making soup and bread, so that provided a little comfort, anyway. My husband was thirsty after working outside in the cold so long.

Our North Dakota winter has been more challenging this year than the past few years. We may not realize how cold temperatures and exertion can affect the hydration status of our body. We tend to be more aware of our thirst and need for liquids in the summer when the weather is warm.

Depending on our age and other factors, our bodies are made up of about 60% water regardless of the season.

During the winter, our bodies work to retain the heat in our body's core, where our vital organs such as heart and lungs are, instead of our feet and hands.

We bundle ourselves in layers of heavier clothes, including sweaters, coats and perhaps, heavy boots. We may not even realize that we are perspiring.

We go from one heated area to another heated area for survival. We travel with our vehicle heaters blowing hot air at us. All that dry air tends to dehydrate our skin.

In the winter, we are losing a lot of water as we breathe in the cold outdoor air and exhale. When you see your breath, that is a signal that water is leaving your body, forming a vapor.

Our level of hydration affects our ability to think and make decisions. We might feel irritable, tired and/or have headaches even with mild dehydration. Our skin may be flaky and itchy.

What's a person to do?
Let's start with our

Let's start with our skin. Remember to wear a

moisturizing broad-spectrum sunscreen on your face, nose and other exposed skin because sun can damage your skin even in the winter.

After coming inside from the cold, you may be tempted to take a long, hot shower, but that may not be particularly helpful. A shorter shower followed by applying lotion to damp skin can help keep your skin healthy

Next, hydrate your body from the inside. Our body needs an ongoing supply of liquid in order to flush wastes from our body, carry nutrients throughout the body and to regulate our body temperature and many other functions.

Even if you do not feel thirsty, drink more fluids and enjoy water-rich nourishing foods such as fruits and vegetables in the winter. Keep a water bottle with you and sip all day. We need at least two quarts of water a day from beverages and foods.

Remember that you have a "personal hydration meter" available every time you visit the bathroom. Check out the color of your urine. It should be a pale, straw-like color if you are fully hydrated. However, some foods (such as beets and berries) and medications can affect the color of urine.

Warm beverages may be more appealing in the winter than cold beverages, but both will hydrate you.

Caffeinated beverages such as coffee are slightly dehydrating, so you might want to switch to herbal teas or decaffeinated coffee in the afternoon if you need a caffeinated pick-me-up in the morning.

Alcohol-containing beverages are not hydrating and can have a "diuretic" (or water-losing) effect. Be sure to counterbalance caffeinated and alcohol-containing beverages, if you consume them, with extra glasses of water.

Here's a simple recipe that you can modify to suit your taste for sweetness. The basic ingredients may have some health benefits in addition to hydrating your body.

Honey is rich in natural disease-fighting antioxidants, and darker honey provides more antioxidants than light. Honey has been used as a cough suppressant, and it may have some immune-boosting effects.

Lemon juice is rich in the antioxidant vitamin C, which may help fight colds through its effect on boosting the immune system.

Ginger root adds flavor to your beverage and is rich in antioxidants with potential disease-fighting benefits.

Honey, Lemon and Ginger

1 cup hot water

1 tablespoon fresh lemon iuice


1 tablespoon honey

1 small slice peeled ginger root (about 1 teaspoon)

Heat water. Add lemon juice, honey and ginger root, if desired. Stir well to dissolve the honey. Allow to stand a couple minutes to blend flavors. Remove ginger and savor the warming effect.

Makes one serving with 70 calories, 0 grams (g) fat, 0 g protein, 19 g carbohydrate, 0 g fiber and 10 milligrams sodium.

Helping words

These words should not frighten us. What should give us pause, however, is the prospect of not preparing for that imminent meeting with God. A sure way of not finding our way to Heaven is to trip up over obstacles that the evil one throws down in front of us. So, how are you religious? How do you live out in your body that which you believe? It is very important that you and I answer that question before God.

Some people will tell me with a straight face that they are "spiritual but not religious." Over the past forty years of my life, I have been trying to get folks who say such things like this to understand how absolutely ignorant they sound when they say, "I'm spiritual but not religious."

Spiritual but not Religious? That's like saying I prefer summer but I despise warmth, or I love winter, but I despise cold. I'm telling you folks, summer's heat and winter's cold go together, and unless you live on the equator, there's nothing you can do about that!

There is no such thing as being spiritual without being religious. Just because you avoid going to a building with people in it singing and offering themselves to God, you are not avoiding being religious. In fact, by doing that, you are religiously acting out what you unfortunately believe about "religion." And thus, your spirit may well be in trouble. And if your own spirit is in trouble, so, too, is your body and soul.

The term secular has the connotation of "worldly." A terms like "institutional Secular man worries more church" and "established" about his 401k than he does in White Shield. Secular man worries more

about his own soul. He might, too, avoid a church full of people singing and offering themselves to God in worship. Why? Because he doesn't realize that all he has is a gift from God; and in a matter of

one second, he could be separated from all of it... forever. And if he persists in living out his idolatry to money and things, he could lose even his loved ones...for all eternity.

A religious man, who happens to have a healthy 401k, knows that all he is and all he has is a gift from God and belongs to God's poor ones; and ultimately even he himself belongs to God whom he serves. So, in his spirit, formed by a solid faith, a man who is both spiritual and religious moves about in a secular world and religiously gives thanks to God and shares what he has as a sign of his belief in Jesus Christ.

Words definitely matter. Are we spiritual persons? Or are we religious persons? Is our religious spirituality solidly Christian and lived out religiously? Or Has it been watered down by secularism?

The Secular world seeks always and everywhere to defeat the religious world of Christ and it seeks to crush the Kingdom of God. Pope Pius IX noticed what I have also come to notice over the years. He said, "Secularism is the direct denial of the Kingship of Christ. By organizing social life as if God did not exist, Secularism leads to apostasy of the Masses and the ruining of society."

If we understand the need to be truly religious, then we understand that our spirituality matters to the way God-given grace helps us avoid all those other pesky tricks of Satan and thereby avoid sins that hurt souls and harden hearts along the way.

We might want to reflect on this and be convinced that it is a very good thing to be souls formed both religiously and spiritually in Christ, awaiting the Kingdom of Heaven.

Truly, words do matter. Are we religious persons? Or are we only spiritual persons? The answer we give truly matters.

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


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


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
