## NDSU's First Building

### **DAKOTA DATEBOOK**

Dakota Datebook written by Lane Sunwall

March 8, 2022 — It was this day, March 8 1890, that a bill established the North Dakota Agricultural College, the forerunner of NDSU. Although established, it would take another year before the State Legislature appropriated the money needed to erect the school's first permanent

Prior to construction of College Hall, now known as Old Main, the Agricultural College's first classes were held in a Fargo basement and a nearby farm.

The building was certainly an improvement for the school's 123 students, but was perhaps a bit crowded. College Hall initially packed within its walls the chemistry, biology,

botanical, veterinary and math departments. The unfinished third floor was utilized as a gym and the tower housed the president's office.

Old Main's importance has diminished over time as other buildings have been constructed. However, NDSU's first permanent structure remains one of the schools most beautiful and iconic buildings.





## Harvey Picken, Minot's Ace Pilot

#### **DAKOTA GARDENER**

March 18, 2022 — In aerial combat, an ace is a pilot who shoots down five enemy aircraft. One of North Dakota's ten aces came from Minot. His name was Harvey Picken.

Born in 1916, Picken graduated from Minot State Teachers College in May of 1940 and worked for the Great Northern Railway as a fireman, shoveling coal into locomotives. In December of 1940, Mr. Picken enlisted in the U.S. Navy to become a pilot.

By the time the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor in December 1941, Harvey Picken had already earned his combat wings and was a Navy flight instructor in Florida. Wishing to transfer to combat status, Picken was instead assigned to aerial photography school in Hawaii.

As an aerial photographer onboard the aircraft carrier Intrepid in the South Pacific, Picken flew a Hellcat fighter plane. Being a photographer might sound like a safe job, but Picken was assigned to photograph enemy positions, and the Navy did not provide fighter escorts for photo

reconnaissance. That meant Picken had to protect himself. And what a good job he did. On September 13, 1944, Picken shot down his first Japanese plane. About a week later he became an ace in one day when he shot down five Japanese aircraft near Formosa.

Lieutenant Picken, in his Hellcat fighter, became an ace twice over, with a total of eleven enemy planes downed, thanks in part to his Hellcat, which was faster and better armored than the renowned Japanese Zero.

Picken flew photo and combat missions through the remainder of World War II in the Pacific, and he narrowly missed being killed by a kamikaze plane at Okinawa in 1945. The kamikaze made a direct hit on the Intrepid, hitting the pilot's "ready room" just after Picken had left. It was his closest brush with death during the war.

When the war ended, Harvey Picken, promoted to lieutenant commander, returned home to Minot where he went back to work with the Great Northern Railway. He later owned two

Minot restaurants, and, in 1971, went to Alaska to work on the oil pipeline.

Harvey Picken and his wife, Mary, retired in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where he died on this date in 1997, at the age of 80.

Interestingly, the aircraft carrier Intrepid, on which Harvey Picken served, is now a floating museum and National Historic Landmark in New York City. On this day, Datebook remembers the legacy of ace pilot Harvey Picken of Minot, who was one of the nation's "Greatest Generation"—those who served their country so nobly and so well during World War II.

Petitions for the 2022 director election must be filed with the McLean Electric Cooperative by April 22, 2022.

According to the bylaws, any member of McLean Electric Cooperative who is a member of this cooperative as a bona fide resident of the district he/she represents and is in no way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise can become a candidate for the board of directors. Directors shall be elected by the members at large at the MEC annual meeting on June 21, 2022, in Garrison.

Directors have a fiduciary responsibility to the cooperative. They exercise care, time, and responsibility in reviewing cooperative matters. Directors treat cooperative business as if it were their own. Directors devote a certain amount of time to the cooperative. At a minimum, a director attends each monthly board meeting. Directors learn about the industry as a whole by reading other materials and by attending state and national meetings. An understanding of the issues facing the industry is vital. To help directors with their responsibilities, training is offered through the electric cooperative's statewide organization. Courses cover director duties and liabilities, understanding the electric business, board roles and relationships, strategic planning, and financial decision-making. Directors currently serving the cooperative find the duty extremely rewarding.

## Love What You Do

#### THE PELUSO REPORT

You definitely have to love what you do to be able to endure the pure punishment ice fishing can throw at you. Cold weather, heavy winds, and finicky fish are just part of the equation. Mix in some green clients, high expectations of magazine cover pictures and you have a recipe for disaster ... or at least frustration.

Either way, I always try to take everything in stride and if you know me, I'm extremely laid back; if you know me really well, you know I have a pretty long fuse and it takes a lot to rattle me or get me off my path. This winter has definitely tried to do all of the above! Sorry winter, you ran into the wrong

Anyway, as tough as it has been at times on Devils Lake recently, it has actually made me work even harder. I don't play or coach hockey anymore, but that doesn't mean I'm not still competitive. Now, my opponents are the elements and

So, what are we finding right now on Devils Lake as far as the bite is concerned? If you keep grinding and working you will catch some fish. It's not easy and it's definitely what I call a guided bite; a spot on a spot type of deal and small windows when you need to be there. I've talked at length with some of my guide buddies and we all agree there is plenty to eat in the lake for these fish.

Walleyes are still for the most part shallow in the early mornings and later evenings. A mix of buckshot rattle spoons, tungsten jigs with a full minnow, and the old school plain hook and minnow is working. Make sure you are set up before the sun starts to poke over the skyline. That feeding window is small!

Perch, well, they are shallow, they are in between, and they are deep. Why? Because freshwater shrimp know no boundaries and they are everywhere and that's what these perch are feeding on. When you stumble on a pod they are either biters or not. It doesn't take long for you to know if they are on or not. Small tungsten lures tipped with spikes seem to be doing well.

Again, I still have a few weeks left of ice fishing for the season, but for me it is winding down. I've really shifted my attention to booking these early spring river trips on the Missouri River near Bismarck. I'm also booking my trips on Lake Sakakawea for this summer. If you are thinking of a trip, get a hold of me so we can get you in!



#### Sales and Use approves funding for Wally statue

Funding for the refurbishment of the Garrison statue was approved at the Garrison City Council's Sales and Use Tax Committee meeting last Monday evening.

The request for \$10,000, which was made by the Garrison Chamber of Commerce, received a unanimous vote from the committee members. The funding for this will come from the Community Development Fund.



# Should You Keep or Toss Foods Beyond the Package Date?

"Mom, I found some curry paste in my cupboard," my son texted.

"It's three years past the date on the package. Can I use it?" he asked.

He added "LOL" (laughing out loud) at the end of his text.

I am sure he knew my answer.

"Throw it," I replied.

I think I texted him a bugeyed cartoon.

I don't like the idea of throwing food, but after three years, both quality and potentially safety could be

He had offered to make me curry next time he comes home. I will be checking his food package dates. I'll text him that with an "LOL."

I'm not sure if my two young adults conspired to ask me questions that day.

"Mom, is it OK to eat yogurt that's a week past its date? It looks and smells OK," my daughter asked.

"Yes, you can eat it," I replied. In fact, yogurt is fine one to two weeks beyond the date, if stored at refrigerator temperature.

My kids must be spring cleaning their cupboards and as it remains solidly frozen;

Taking stock of the food you have on hand is a good practice. Plan your meals taking into account the food you have on hand so you are not surprised by food past the product date.

Use your senses, except taste, to help you decide what is safe to consume. Remember the most dangerous microorganisms and their toxins have no offaromas or flavors.

Food product dates help guide us to the best quality, but food dates are not required on most packaged foods. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is working with the food industry to standardize "Best if Used By" on product packages.

With the exception of baby food, you can use most food a while beyond the date on the package as long as it is stored safely.

To avoid food waste, be a scientist and monitor temperature and time of your refrigerated and frozen

Refrigerators should maintain food at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or lower, and freezers should keep food solidly frozen at 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

Food in your freezer will remain "safe" to eat as long however, you might not want to eat the food due to quality

Freezer-burn is a quality issue. Freezer-burned food is dehydrated and may have off-colors, off-flavors and a grayish, leathery texture.

While you probably won't get sick eating freezer-burned food, you won't get any compliments from your family on the tasty meatloaf.

To avoid freezer burn, place meat products in airtight packaging such as freezer bags or overwrap with butcher paper or heavy aluminum foil. Vacuum packaging also extends freezer life.

Be sure to list the date of purchase on the package.

For pantry foods, such as dry goods and canned goods, write your date of purchase on the front and then rotate your stock as you put away groceries or organize your cupboards. Put the oldest food in the front of your cupboard so you use it first.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), you can store canned acidic food (tomatoes, fruit) for about 18 months and canned low-acid food (vegetables, beans) for five years. The Canned Food Alliance suggests a rule of thumb: use all canned food within two years of purchase.

We at NDSU Extension have reduced sodium many food safety resources, including a "Food Storage Guide" and a "Food Freezing Guide." Visit www.ag.ndsu. edu/food and search the titles online.

If you use apps on your mobile device, download the "FoodKeeper App" from USDA. See www.foodsafety.gov/keepfood-safe/foodkeeper-app to learn more.

Take a look at your cupboards and refrigerator. You might have the makings for this recipe, which is courtesy of the Canned Food Alliance (www.mealtime.org). You could swap in your favorite type of canned beans. The recipe called for dry white wine, but vou could use vegetable or chicken broth in its place.

Tuscan-style Pasta with Cannellini Beans

1 pound ziti or penne pasta or other pasta

1/4 cup olive oil

5 large garlic cloves, finely chopped (or 5 teaspoons minced garlic, available in jars)

1/4 pound curly escarole, sliced or 1 small bunch arugula or 4 ounces spinach

1 16-ounce can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed, reduced sodium

1 14 S-ounce can diced tomatoes with juice, undrained,

2/3 cup dry white wine or broth (chicken or vegetable)

Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste

1/4 cup fresh basil leaves, thinly sliced

Parmesan cheese (if desired)


Cook pasta according to the package directions. Heat oil in a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Add garlic and cook until slightly browned (less than a minute). Add escarole, arugula or spinach, stirring occasionally until wilted, about 2 minutes. Add beans, tomatoes with their juice and wine or broth. Simmer 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Season to taste with salt and pepper; stir in basil and heat through. Drain pasta and toss with the sauce. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese if desired.


Makes eight servings. Without added salt, each serving has 350 calories, 8 grams (g) fat, 12 g protein, 57 g carbohydrate, 6 g fiber and 190 milligrams sodium.

## Gearing up for Spring Pike on the Fly

Like any new adventure in the outdoors, fly fishing takes best when bolstered by early and frequent success. No other species provides more heart-stopping strikes, wrist-jolting runs, and a sense of accomplishment out of the gate for new fly rodders than the northern pike.

That early and oft-occurring spring excitement they bring makes them the perfect target for first timers on the fly rod. It doesn't take much more than a moderately strong rod and a few flashy flies to get started and catch fish. What follows is a primer for the region's premier early season pursuit on the long rod.

A Strong Combo

Most pike can be managed on an eight-weight fly rod, and its relatively stout nature allows for it to pull double duty for smallmouth and largemouth bass when the spring run of northerns tapers off and those species kick into high gear. While the reel is often the second thought when it comes to a fly-fishing combo, one with a reliable drag mechanism is key in managing the run of bigger fish, so investing in a model that's a level or two up from basic is not a bad idea when it comes to turning bigger fish in spring.

If adventures on the long rod are likely to be for pike only, or include muskies as well, consider upping the capacity of the rod and reel to a ten-weight combo. Line to match the reel is a given and both floating line and sink-tip options will get an offering in front of staging spring northerns. A weight forward, eight-weight floating line (written as WF8F) or weight forward, ten-weight floating line (WF10F) is a good start, with various sinking options providing choices when pike are a bit deeper.

Considering though that most spring pike are up in the shallows or staging just off them in tributary creeks and warming bays, a floating line will get the job done. The weight-forward nature of

such a line allows even novice casters to get those bigger pike streamers out to where the fish are and turns them over for a natural presentation as soon as they hit the water. When considering a leader to bring it all together, those with a wire shock tippet and a metal clip for attaching flies at the end will prevent bite-offs, are easy to use and typically aren't too distracting to aggressive springtime pike.

Keep Flies Simple & Flashy With the rod, reel and line selected, a handful of bright, flashy flies will work for northerns in spring. Remember that these are earlyseason pike – not scrutinizing bonefish on clear Caribbean flats – and they aren't terribly picky. When considering those first flies to buy or craft, think of what pike tend to slam on standard tackle: spoons, big twister tails, large bucktail spinners and the like. None of those standard offerings are especially detailed.

None of them look like anything in particular. They

simply trigger that reaction strike that spring pike are known for. The same should be considered when picking out flies or crafting them at the vise. Keep it simple, keep it big and keep it flashy.

Favorite flies include simple offerings such as bunny leeches consisting of a tied and wound strip of rabbit fur. Lefty's deceiver is a bucktail and feather combination that has accounted for more pike on the fly rod than I can now remember. Larger Clouser minnows tied on hooks from 1 to 4/0 are a simple bucktail offering that also gets down in the column. Bright color combinations like red-andwhite, orange-and-white and chartreuse-and-white provide great attractor patterns, and a couple darker flies in black or purple for those cloudy spring days are good to have as a backup as well.

While the flies can be extremely detailed and well put together when they hit the water, after a fish or two, most pike streamers start to look

the same – long, injured and giving off the appearance of an easy meal. Stick to the rule of five inches or more in length, a fishy form with brighter colors, and relative ease of castability.

Take It To 'Em

From there, the rest is just pike fishing. Find those channels where northerns run in spring, target feeder creeks and warming bays, hit those dams that block upstream migration, and its likely pike will be there for the plucking. Time it right and the angling can be non-stop and provide incredible practice when it comes to casting and laying into the powerful sideways stripstyle hookset that is required to drive a hook into the bony beak of a pike and the rod angle and drag management needed to bring them in.

With a spring of exciting pike fishing on the fly rod, a whole new world of angling is opened, and even the most novice long-rodder can record some great memories.

## Young Anglers

In the dreamsicle light of dusk on the backwater bay, I led a line of young anglers out onto the snow-covered water in hopes that a few willing crappies would fill the couple of hours between our afternoon of sledding and a planned pizza dinner back at the cabin.

The line, however, was longer this time as my oldest son and the three kids of two of my wife's friends joined me. Among them was my godson, Gavin, and his younger brother, Lincoln, now three years older than when I had last seen them and five years older than when we had last fished together.

That pairing was my first trial run as an ice fishing mentor, as Gavin then at age five, and I, sought crappies and bluegills on the ice of a small farm pond west of where I used to live, and his brother joined us for a couple winters thereafter before I moved away. In the fading sunset, I eyeballed a spot along the channel's bend against the near shoreline and punched a hole, calling out to Gavin to grab the Vexilar and asking if he remembered how to use it.

Assuring me he had plenty of experience since our last fishing trip together, he yelled out a depth of 18 feet as I created a couple more slushy cones in a nearby line and he noted a rise up the channel edge. We popped the hubs out of the

oversized thermal tent and set it up, punching holes for bobber rods and kicking out the legs of the bench seat the younger anglers would join us on. After sliding the shack into place, I set about adjusting the bobber stops on an assortment of rods, keying the dangling minnows to a foot off the bottom in the hole just outside the shack, about the right height from memory from previous seasons spent fishing the bay.

I had hoped the success would be similar but was happy just for some ice time with old students and new ones. With each slide of the string and adjustment of foam, Gavin was there to take the rod from my hand and deploy it inside the blue-sided tarp house for the already antsy younger anglers waiting for the evening to begin.

"Remember when I used to do that for you," I asked him as I handed another rod over, recalling our times on the hardwater of southwestern Minnesota, "and I remember when you made the switch from the float to the Vexilar, watching my spring bobber for a hit from those crappies." I continued as he chuckled in recognition, running the last of the combos into the icehouse. Making certain my son and his newest angling buddy Kaiden had their bobbers in place, lights properly hung and illuminating the shack for our efforts, I sat next to Gavin and dropped the transducer down alongside his line and set my jig in the adjacent hole.

Despite the change in location, the crowd of young anglers with us, and the astounding growth of a kindergartener into a teenager, it all felt so familiar as together we watched the screen and a fish rolled in below my jig and the small spoon he was working. Taken back in

time, I recommended a jiggle and pause presentation as the fish rose and I reminded him to watch the tip of his rod as the line engulfed his stalled lure on the screen. The last eyelet jumped, and before I could say "get him," Gavin set the hook on the fish below. A green-and-gold crappie came up the hole and he lifted it for the rest in the house to see and completed for me the memory reborn as reality a half decade from our last fishing trip.

While the crappie wasn't quite the foot-long slabs we had come to expect from what he and his brother now refer to as "the secret pond," it was perhaps the most significant fish of the season for me as the realization that the young angler I had mentored had now become a mentor to others, a solid righthand-man on the ice when I would likely need to call on him again, and ultimately, a capable sportsman in his own right. Pushing through the finicky fish that remained, together with Lincoln we helped the two younger ice anglers stave off boredom as we passed the puck of the Vexilar around and showed them the fish moving below, but frustratingly not biting. Up until we received the dinner bell text from the cabin, together we passed on information, experience, and sometimes just the silly stories we had in days gone by of wet boots, stuck trucks, and wild fishing.

The fact that Gavin told more stories than I did, and the lone crappie he pulled up was enough to make it one of the most memorable outings of the year, if only for the chance to experience the coming full circle of my efforts and the enduring hope that it will continue turning ... in our outdoors.

## Harvey Picken, Minot's Ace Pilot

#### **DAKOTA DATEBOOK**

March 18, 2022 — In aerial combat, an ace is a pilot who shoots down five enemy aircraft. One of North Dakota's ten aces came from Minot. His name was Harvey Picken.

Born in 1916, Picken graduated from Minot State Teachers College in May of 1940 and worked for the Great Northern Railway as a fireman, shoveling coal into locomotives. In December of 1940, Mr. Picken enlisted in the U.S. Navy to become a pilot.

By the time the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor in December 1941, Harvey Picken had already earned his combat wings and was a Navy flight instructor in Florida. Wishing to transfer to combat status, Picken was instead assigned to aerial photography school in Hawaii.

As an aerial photographer onboard the aircraft carrier Intrepid in the South Pacific, Picken flew a Hellcat fighter plane. Being a photographer might sound like a safe job, but Picken was assigned to photograph enemy positions, and the Navy did not provide fighter escorts for photo reconnaissance. That meant Picken had to protect himself. And what a good job he did. On September 13, 1944, Picken shot down his first Japanese plane. About a week later he became an ace in one day when he shot down five Japanese aircraft near Formosa.

Lieutenant Picken, in his Hellcat fighter, became an ace twice over, with a total of eleven enemy planes downed, thanks in part to his Hellcat, which was faster and better armored than the renowned Japanese Zero.

Picken flew photo and combat missions through the remainder of World War II in the Pacific, and he narrowly missed being killed by a kamikaze plane at Okinawa in 1945. The kamikaze made a direct hit on the Intrepid, hitting the pilot's "ready room" just after Picken had left. It was his closest brush with death during the war.

When the war ended, Harvey Picken, promoted to lieutenant commander, returned home to Minot where he went back to work with the Great Northern Railway. He later owned two Minot restaurants, and, in 1971, went to Alaska to work on the oil pipeline.

Harvey Picken and his wife, Mary, retired in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where he died on this date in 1997, at the age of 80.

Interestingly, the aircraft carrier Intrepid, on which Harvey Picken served, is now a floating museum and National Historic Landmark in New York City. On this day, Datebook remembers the legacy of ace pilot Harvey Picken of Minot, who was one of the nation's "Greatest Generation" – those who served their country so nobly and so well during World War II.
