TURTLE LAKE, ND – On Wednesday, May 18, 2022, First Responders, county officials and other mutual aid responders plan to respond to a simulated exercise for an active shooter event at the Turtle Lake School.

Local and State agencies from the area will be involved in the training and response exercise during the afternoon and evening hours. For safety reasons, we ask the public to stay away from the school.

Patients with simulated injuries will be placed on the scene for responders to deal with. The Turtle Lake Hospital and Sanford Air Helicopter

will also be participating. Photo and video opportunities will be provided for you, and interviews can be conducted during the exercise by local & contracted experts. When you arrive at the site, find one of the Heartland staff members (wearing blue shirts) and they will provide you with a briefing, sign you in, and get you a vest to wear for identification. The Heartland staff will escort you into the incident site for photos or video, and will assist you in securing interviews.

When you Have a lough Parenting Dau

My four-year-old and I were particularly struggling one day. I was not using my effective parenting tools and instead was yelling, lecturing, blaming, shaming and complaining. At one point I looked at my daughter, frustrated, and said, "You and I need to just take a break from talking to each other for the rest of the night."

Did that work? No. We continued to argue and butt heads.

When it was finally bedtime (HUZZAH we made it to bedtime!), my daughter laid down for the night, and I took a deep breath and said through partially gritted teeth, "I am sorry. I've been yelling tonight, and haven't been being very nice."

This was all I could choke out through the continued tension. My daughter rolled

over in her bed and says: "It is okay mom, we will both try again tomorrow." We will both try again

tomorrow. Yes, that is exactly what we

need. We need a do over.

In the parenting world, we call operating with tense emotions what Dan Siegel has named "flipped lid." Here is a little brain anatomy lesson for you. Our pre-frontal cortex houses our ability to empathize, rationalize, make good decisions and have compassion for others, and our amygdala houses our emotions. When we get frustrated, anxious, mad, furious, our amygdala starts to fire and can no longer talk to our prefrontal cortex. Our negative emotions affect our ability to make good decisions. You read that correctly, our brain stops us from making good decisions when we are upset. That is why when we are mad, we often do things we regret.

Parenting often is a frustrating venture which offers us a lot of opportunities to practice "putting our lids back on.'

As a parent, the first thing you can focus on doing when you feel yourself getting frustrated is getting those parts of the brain to talk to each other again. How can we do this? For me, it might mean

taking a brisk walk around the block if my husband is home, drinking an ice-cold glass of water, rocking in our rocking chair for a few moments, or taking some nice deep breaths. I then can access some problem-solving parenting tools in my brain.

The cool thing is we can also teach our kids about "flipping their lids." Make sure you do this when everyone in the family is calm and not in the heat of a temper tantrum. Questions that are good to ask include: What kinds of things do you like to feel? Do you like hugs when you are angry? Do you like to listen to music? This is a learning process.

When the beginning of a tantrum starts to happen, you can say, "You look like you are about to flip your lid, do you want to find your blanket to help you put your lid back on?" This technique is not about creating a perfect tantrum-less child. (This does not exist.) The purpose is to help our kids recognize their feelings and help them use tools to positively handle those feelings.

So, dear parents, we all have parenting days we wish we can do over. The good news is those kids are often more forgiving than we are of ourselves. Hang in there, and happy holidays.

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STRAWBERRY POUND CAKE

By Yellow Bliss Road

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup plain greek yogurt
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 1 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup diced strawberries about 1 ¹/₄ cup whole

Glaze:

- 1/2 cup smashed strawberries about 1 cup whole
- 2 cups powdered sugar

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray an 8 or 9-inch loaf pan with non-stick cooking spray, set aside.

In medium-sized bowl, stir together flour, baking powder and salt.

In a separate, large mixing bowl mix Greek yogurt, sugar, eggs, extract and oil. Slowly stir in the dry ingredients until just incorporated.

Fold in the strawberries and spoon batter into the prepared pan.

Bake for about 50 minutes or until center is set. Remove from oven and let sit 10 minutes, then turn out onto cooling rack to cool completely. While the bread is cooling, make the glaze. In a medium-sized bowl combine smashed strawberries and powdered sugar.

OUR OUTDOORS Here Comes the Sun(glasses)

It's been a long mix of chilly winter and underwhelming spring. Cold temperatures, snow, rain and general nastiness extending into May have built up a longing for the warmth of the later stretch of the season and the start of summer, and maybe with recent changes in the pattern, just possibly, that warmup is coming. With it comes the search for one vital fishing tool that not only reminds me that even in the cloudiest, coldest stretches, the sun is up there and getting stronger and a set of sunglasses is or will shortly be in order.

I'm not an expensive sunglasses guy by any means. A cheap pair from the cardboard rack at the back of a fishing section usually lasts a season or two, and with a layer of polarization material gives me the vision I need on the water to pick out the shadowy form of a largemouth bass under the removed reflectivity of the water's surface. I'm less concerned about fit than function, and whether it's oval eye wraps or a bit boxier standard pair, the lenses will serve their purpose with an added element of fish finding on those longed-for sunny days in the near future. I figure I'll look cooler with a fish in hand while wearing them anyhow, whether they compliment my facial features or not. with the angling experience. I learned at a young age, the most expensive sunglasses are often the shortest lived, and the priceto-productivity ratio is inversely related. Additionally, as a fly angler they not only help in picking those missile-shaped fish out on small streams, or sizing up the horde of early summer bluegills moving in behind my surface popper - those glasses provide a vital layer of protection. Anyone whipping the long rod has, from time to time whether due to bad form, a snag on the back cast or a missed hookset, sent a dressed hook of some sort back in the general direction of their face. And while the Spartan soldier Dilios may have pointed out in the movie 300 that the gods were fit to bless us with a spare, protecting both eyes from airborne sharp and pointy projectiles is always a good idea.

Those towing crankbaits throughout the warm water season know the risk as well, as walleyes are hoisted over the gunwales of the boat, flipping and frequently tossing the hooks, which boast three such prongs that more than once have come too close for comfort to an avant garde eyebrow piercing. In addition to providing protection from the sun's rays, even the cheapest set of shades from the discount bin will provide a shield from those errant hooks that are part and parcel learned at a young age, the most expensive sunglasses are often the shortest lived, and the priceto-productivity ratio is inversely related. The more a set of shades costs, the less likely it is to stick around. Whether crushed under a misplaced footstep on the bow of the boat, blown away with a baseball cap from a strong gust of wind or a sudden acceleration of the outboard, or simply knocked off the dock and into the water, it's not uncommon for my sunglasses to meet their maker long before their time, and it seems the spendier they are, the quicker they go.

With so many inexpensive options out there to get the technical aspects of the job done, and the super low price point for polarized lenses these days, I'm all but guaranteed to have a set on hand from one past season or another. True to that formula, those pairs seem to last. While some of them have their frames held together with a pinch of duct tape, others have lenses that constantly need to be popped back into place, and still others are likely collecting dust in the console of the boat, under a truck seat or stashed in an old tackle box, they are all a welcome encounter when it's time to hit the water at this point in the season. From polarization to protection there's no better addition than a set of sunglasses to a warm spring outing with the sun shining, a light breeze blowing and the fish biting ... in our outdoors

Capturing the Confederate DAKOTA DATEBOOK

May 10, 2022 — Arne Ranum's parents came to the United States in 1864, first settling in Wisconsin before moving to the Mekinock area in the Dakota Territory in 1879. While in Wisconsin, 18-year-old Arne Ranum joined the Wisconsin Cavalry for the Union Army.

Ranum took part in many famous Civic War battles during his service, including the Sherman March and the Siege of Richmond. It was looking up a skirt, however, that would give him special recognition for his service.

Members of the Wisconsin Cavalry and the Fourth Michigan Cavalry were chosen for an important expedition: to capture the Confederate president, Jefferson Davis. Among the first soldiers chosen from the Wisconsin Cavalry for the special expedition force was Ranum.

Although both cavalries were sharing the common objective to capture Davis dead or alive and bring him back to union headquarters, the two made it a competition to see who could make the capture. Both cavalries rode hard for the coast, where Davis was planning to board a steamer for Europe. Michigan snuck ahead while Wisconsin took a rest, but the swift Wisconsin cavalry soon passed them.

They approached a creek near confederate headquarters. A

soldier came out waving a white flag of surrender. According to the Grand Forks County Heritage Book, "The forces noticed a tall wash woman at the creek with a water harness across her back and were aroused by her awkward walk." Arne Ranum approached the woman and lifted her skirt with the tip of his saber to reveal man's trousers and shiny combat boots. It was Jefferson Davis. Davis reached for his revolver, but Ranum covered him with his musket. Davis' daughter came running and crying for Ranum not to shoot her father, and Davis made no further attempt to escape. Davis was arrested and taken to Fortress Monroe.

Ranum was awarded Davis' saber for his part in the capture, and according to the Grand Forks County Heritage Book, it was then given to his grandchildren in Grand Forks. Arne Ranum received an honorable discharge following the Civil War and made his way to the Dakota Territory with his family. He is now buried in the Ness Lutheran Church Cemetery at Mekinock.

Civil society? HELPING WORDS

We live in a world where the concept of a "civil society" has been eroding. "Ad Hominem" [meaning: "to the person"] attacks have become the common mode of discussion on social, political, religious and ethical matters in our culture. Essentially "name-calling" substitutes for reasoned argument. I was surprised recently watching a clip of a news commentary show as one commentator, while losing the argument, resorted to shouting and calling his opponent a "punk."

Civil society does not mean that we do not have disagreements or even strongly held views and opinions. It does not even mean that we should not aggressively defend or advocate those positions. What a civil society does not do is dehumanize an opponent by calling that person names simply attempting to win the argument. Even worse are those who rely on threats and violence to prevail.

The Civil Society is really the creation of Christian thought in Western culture. It is based on three commands of Jesus.

The first: "But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, 'You fool!' will be liable to the hell of fire." Matthew 5:22 [ESV]

From this statement Jesus expounds eight principles for living in society:

1. When you have done wrong or harmed another

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you are responsible to make it right.

 Avoid legal battles and if possible negotiate a settlement.
 Avoid desiring what rightfully belongs to another.
 All morality begins with

4. All morality begins with personal responsibility and restraint. 5. Human relationships,

especially marriage, need to be respected.

6. À person's integrity is bound up in honoring his/her word.

7. Avoid revenge or selfdetermined justice.

8. Treat even your enemies with respect. [Matthew 5:23-48]

The Sermon on the Mount ends with an exposition of the Golden Rule: "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 7:12 [ESV].

In the verses that follow Jesus homes in on our judgment and motivations while enacting the Golden Rule:

1. Choose to do the right thing even when it is hard.

2. Determine a person's motivations by the results of his/her actions.

3. Just saying the right words does not mean you have the right motives.

4. You need to have a solid foundation to your beliefs if you are to stand. [Matthew 7:13-27]

For the Christian, living out a Civil Society reflects our belief in one of the central commands of Jesus: "Love your neighbor as yourself." [Matthew 22:39]. The word for "love" here is "agape." It was widely used and defined by Christians as "doing what is in the best interest of another." From this develops the concepts of mercy and iustice as well as fairness in our actions. It is an injunction to "empathy" meaning that we understand the impact our actions and words have on others. Thus, we should choose both carefully.

The Best Backyard Fruit Tree DAKOTA GARDENER

Fruit trees are great for landscapes. Their blossoms are dazzling in spring and the fruits are absolutely delicious.

Do you have a fruit tree in your backyard? If not, what are you waiting for?

When it comes to planting trees, there is an old proverb that goes, "Today is the secondbest day to plant a tree. The best day was yesterday!"

Don't keep waiting. Fruit trees take years before they begin to bear fruit.

What's the best fruit tree for a backyard?

I highly recommend the Evans Bali sour cherry. It has so many great qualities!

First, the tree is small and can fit easily into a landscape. The tree gets no more than 15 feet high and 12 feet across.

Another nice feature is it will pollinate itself. You don't need to plant two different cherry trees for fruit production. One is enough. Nearly all other hardy fruits including apples, pears and American plums require two varieties of trees for fruit production.

A cherry tree looks beautiful all year. In spring, the tree is covered with clusters of bright-

white flowers. The foliage is rich-green in summer, turning orange in fall. The bark is reddish brown and glossy, making it a handsome plant in the winter.

Evans Bali is a tough tree that withstands tough conditions. It was discovered in Alberta and can tolerate our harshest winters. This tree grows well in our soils and can withstand urban conditions and pollution.

Evans Bali is easy to care for. I never spray my tree. In March, I give it a light pruning to open the canopy to more sunlight and air movement. Evans Bali produces very few suckers, which is another reason why I love it.

Best of all, the Evans Bali cherry is famous for its precocity and high yields. You will be picking buckets of cherries after only three to four years. This is in stark contrast with apples and pears where you may wait six years or longer before you get any meaningful harvests.

Although Evans Bali is a sour cherry, its fruits are among the sweetest of all sour cherries. The fruits are perfect for making pies, jams and jellies. No sweet cherries are hardy in North Dakota.

The only significant pest

insecticide to kill the pests.

The major challenge with growing cherries will be the birds. Birds love cherries. You can put a net over your tree to protect your crop.

I take a simpler approach and share my crop with the birds. When I see the birds invading my tree, it indicates the fruits are becoming ripe. When the fruits are ripe enough, I scare the birds away for an hour and harvest the bulk of the crop. The birds can enjoy the rest.

Pitting the fruits can be time consuming. I've recently heard great comments about Leifheit cherry pitters. I'm going to invest in one this year. They pit the fruits quickly and easily.

If you prefer to add a shrub instead of a tree to your landscape, consider the dwarf cherry shrubs from the University of Saskatchewan. Two varieties are most noteworthy. Carmine Jewel will produce abundantly and reliably year after year. Romeo has sweeter fruits and ripens earlier, making it less subject to the fruit flies.

I encourage you to add a cherry tree or shrub to your landscape this spring. Enjoy the beauty of the plants and get ready for some delicious cherry pies and cobblers.

Bomb Balloon **дакота датевоок**

Dakota Datebook written by Merry Helm

May 5, 2022 — It was on this date in 1945 that a Japanese bomb balloon claimed the lives of six people in Oregon. They were the only casualties of World War II in the continental United States. Two of them were the children of Grand Forks railroad engineer, Frank Patzke: 13-year-old Joan and 14-year-old Dick.

Reverend Archie Mitchell and his young expectant wife, Elsie, were hosting an outing for five adolescents who attended Sunday school at the Bly Christian and Missionary Alliance Church. The plan was to have a picnic and do some fishing in the mountains. According to reports, Reverend Mitchell found the main road to the Fremont National Forest blocked by equipment, so he pulled off the road at a different spot where they could fish in a creek.

Mrs. Mitchell and the children got out while Archie was either parking the car or unloading food or both. He heard Joan Patzke say, "Look what I found!" and saw a gigantic balloon she'd discovered caught on some tree branches.

Just a few weeks earlier, one of the other kids, 13-yearold Jay Gifford, had found a weather balloon. He had returned it to the weather station in Klamath Falls, where he was praised for his action. Now, here was another balloon. Someone tugged on one of the balloon's ropes and an on-board bomb detonated.

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The explosion instantly killed all but the Reverend.

During the previous six months, thousands of hydrogenfilled bomb balloons had been launched from a seaside beach in Honshu, Japan. Each was 33-feet across and carried five bombs – four that would cause fires and one that was meant to kill. Traveling in the jet stream, the balloons crossed the Pacific in approximately three days.

The experiment was shortlived, because censorship in the U.S. kept the enemy from learning whether these weapons were doing their job. It was also expensive.

Originally, the balloons were made of rubberized silk. Then, someone thought of using a special waterproof paper traditionally used for making stencils for textile design. The technique for manufacturing the paper was long and laborious; after the paper was made, it was waterproofed by soaking in mulberry juice that had been aged many months.

The government had ordered 10 thousand balloons, and one can only imagine how laborious it was to construct them. Individual sheets of this paper were only about the size of a piece of gift wrap, and they had to be spliced together and laminated three to four layers deep. The paste used was derived from a tuber called "devil's-tongue" and was often eaten by hungry workers on the sly.

Final construction required auditorium-size work spaces, but a bigger problem arose when American B-29 bombers took out two of Japan's three hydrogen plants. Without hydrogen, the balloons were grounded.





May Is Melanoma Awareness Month **PRAIRIE FARE**

In the past year, I have noticed many adults sporting bandages on their noses, chins or backs of their necks.

I do not ask "What happened to you anyway?" I usually have a good idea.

Most will comment that they had skin cancer removed.

Fortunately, in most cases, they have one of the less serious types of skin cancer.

Whenever I see people with bandages on their faces, I tend to examine my own skin more closely.

Is that a harmless freckle or mole – or a potentially cancerous spot?

Skin experts recommend that we know our "A, B, C, D and E's." These are the warning signs of potential skin cancer.

Asymmetry – The halves do not match.

Borders – Uneven, scalloped or notched.

Color – Variety of colors including brown, tan, black, red and/or blue.

Diameter – Usually larger than the size of the eraser on your pencil (1/4 inch).

Evolving – Look for changes in size, shape, color, elevation or symptoms such as bleeding, itching or crusting.

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer. Every year about 5 million people are diagnosed with skin cancer according to the Skin Cancer Foundation.

Regardless of our natural skin color, we all face a risk of skin cancer. Caucasian people have a greater risk of skin cancer than those with darker skin. People of color often are diagnosed at a more advanced stage of skin cancer according to the Skin Cancer Foundation.

Skin is the largest organ of the body, and it is comprised of several layers, including the epidermis (outer later) and the dermis (inner layer).

Basal cells, squamous cells and melanocytes are the cells that make up the epidermis, and you may be familiar with their namesake types of skin cancer. Melanocytes contain melanin, the pigment responsible for the darkening of our skin upon exposure to sunlight. "Melanoma" gets its name from melanocytes.

We need to protect our skin in all seasons. Getting a "tan" whether outdoors or from a tanning bed is not healthy. Yes, your body makes vitamin D from exposure to sun, but we do not need a lot of sun exposure. Selftanning lotions are considered safe.

Melanoma is the most dangerous form of skin cancer, and it is more likely to spread to other parts of the body. With early detection, skin cancer almost always is curable. Be sure to check out any moles, dark spots or growths on your skin.

May is Melanoma Awareness Month. In the Midwest, May brings sunny days, warmer temperatures, gardening, golfing, baseball and numerous outdoor occupational and recreational activities.

Skin cancer can be prevented or deterred with these tips promoted by the North Dakota Cancer Coalition:

Seek shade from ultraviolet (UV) rays, especially during midday (10 a.m. to 2 p.m.).

Cover up to protect exposed skin. Wear long sleeves.

Wear a hat with a wide brim. Ball caps do not protect your ears or the back of your neck.

Grab shades that block UVA and UVB rays.

Rub on sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30 and both UVA and UVB protection. Reapply every two hours.

Talk with a dermatologist for specific product recommendations.

This week I am sharing some resources developed in North Dakota, including a webinar from a cancer survivor. See the fun safety video featuring Parker the Penguin created for kids (or adults who are kids at heart).

Check out the variety of sun safety resources from the North Dakota Cancer Coalition (search online for "ND Cancer Coalition Skin Cancer").

Skin needs protection and good nutrition to stay healthy, just like the rest of our body. Promote skin health by consuming plenty of fluids, colorful fruits and vegetables, and foods rich in omega-3 fats (such as salmon) as part of a balanced, healthful diet.

For more skin nutrition information, see "Nourish Your Skin" from NDSU Extension for more information (search "NDSU Nourish Your Skin").

This nutrient-rich smoothie can be frozen in small cups with a plastic spoon as a handle. You can eat it like an ice pop or let it melt slightly to become a slushy fruit and veggie snack.

Pineapple-Mango Green Smoothie

8 ice cubes

1 cup pineapple chunks, diced (fresh or canned in juice)

1 large mango, diced 2 cups fresh spinach leaves 1/2 cup pineapple juice

1/2 teaspoon coconut extract

Place ingredients in blender or food processor in the order written. Blend until smooth.

Makes four servings. Each serving has 80 calories, 0 grams (g) fat, 0 g protein, 20 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber and 15 milligrams sodium.




