When Parents Disagree

I keep a running list of my "most asked" parenting questions. One of the top questions is: "What do you do when parents don't agree on something related to parenting?

Usually when I get this question, the parent is very obviously embarrassed, and I can tell that it took a lot of courage from them to ask. To which I say, "I don't know any parents who agree on everything related to parenting.

Parenting is a big deal, and chances are there is going to be a situation that comes up that you and your co-parent disagree on. You may disagree on most things actually.

Common things parents disagree on include: chore responsibilities, discipline, types of food kids eat, children's activities, screen time, levels of respect and curfews.

Before I have parents hash out their disagreements, I suggest an exercise. Each parent takes a piece of paper and answers the following questions:

1. Imagine your child at 26. What do you hope they are like? What qualities do they have? What does their life look like? (Examples: respectful, working in a career they enjoy, healthy relationships, etc.)

2. What are your top three priorities in your current state of parenting? (Examples: bed time, safe use of a car, spending some family time each week.)

3. What is something you consider a "non-negotiable" when parenting your kids? (Maybe you feel very strongly you need to eat breakfast every day together as a family.) 4. How should we handle

parenting issues we disagree on?

After writing down your answers, exchange your lists. Why does this exercise need to happen in writing? In Emily Oster's book "The Family Firm," she says answers need to be written and then discussed. Otherwise, one person's answer may impact what the other person says because, in conversation, someone always has to go first. By writing answers, all parents can go first.

Take the opportunity to read over your co-parent's answers. Chances are that answers are going to surprise you. Most of the time parents learn something about their fellow co-parents.

"I didn't know you cared so much about our kids doing their own laundry!'

"I never realized the reason you get so worked up around bedtime is because you never had a set bedtime as a kid and made a promise that isn't going to be something that you bring with you to our family."

"I never knew that eating breakfast together meant so much to you.'

As co-parents, you have the chance to discuss your lists and have the discussion. Why do we hope our kids have these qualities? What are we doing in our current parenting that helps those qualities and skills grow? Why are these

a priority for you? Again, chances are you are going to learn something about your co-parent you didn't know before.

The great thing is that this exercise can be done frequently, and parents are able to change the questions to whatever parenting situation currently exists.

So what do you do when you disagree?

You pull out a good ol' pen and paper, and you write the disagreement down. For example: "Why do you feel like this method of discipline is the only one we can use in our household?"

You exchange your answers and then listen, understand and talk it out. Go back to your first list. Does this method of discipline help build any of the qualities I am hoping my child will have in the future? How does this method fit in with our family priorities and nonnegotiables? Then you can call me and sign up for a parenting class, and we can talk about all the different ways to solve problems in your family.

Parenting is hard, and it is super easy to let the disagreements between parents affect the family.

Most often though, parents realize that they actually agree on the most important thing: they love their kids a lot. Everyone wants the very best for their children. It's how to get there that can sometimes require some additional discussion.

So when you disagree with your co-parent, try understanding their perspective or their "why" first, see how both of your opinions fit with your parenting goals and priorities, and then make a decision. The great thing about parenting is you can readjust your decision when you need to.

Growing up

Rome wasn't built in a day, but the new silos at GHS Garrison were close: in a week's time, their new silos grew and grew to an impressive 142 feet.

Concrete was poured shortly before noon on May 2. Shortly after 1 a.m. this past Sunday, with construction going 24/7, external work was completed with the last bit of concrete poured.

There is just under 3,000 yards of concrete above ground and about 1 million pounds of rebar above ground, which makes up those silos, explained Chris Gratton, general manager at CHS Garrison.

Turtle Lake Ambulance begins construction of new facility

Construction has begun on Turtle Lake's new ambulance hall, commemorated by board members during a groundbreaking ceremony on May 4.

The new facility, located at 259 Burke Street in the southeast part of Turtle Lake, will be nearly 5,000 square feet, with a large garage bay, meeting and training area for region-wide training courses, and room for growth.

The project is expected to cost \$700,000 when complete. Loans and existing mill levies are supplying initial capital.

Water supply project falls through

The Washburn City Commission was recently forced to scrap plans to carry through with their bidding process for the construction of a new water transmission system designed to deliver up to 215,000,000 gallons annually to MidWest Ag's subsidiary, Blue Flint Ethanol.

A motion to officially cancel their bids was endorsed by city commissioners at their May 9 meeting, as Blue Flint has opted to partner with Rainbow Energy, which had finalized the acquisition of Coal Creek Station from GRE (Great River Energy) - the original water provider - last week.

As a result, staging designs for the development of a new water treatment plant near the downtown softball complex have been put on ice.

Gardening Has Many Benefits for Kids, Adults **PRAIRIE FARE**

When late May arrives and I plant flowers, herbs and vegetables, I think about all the gardening I did as a child.

We lived up to our last name of "Garden" with a large vegetable volunteered in various ways as part of that program. I encourage you to explore the gardening courses offered by Extension organizations found throughout the U.S.

Gardening is beneficial on several levels. You will learn about the science of horticulture, get physical activity and have access to fresh produce at its freshest and most nutritious.

Researchers have shown that children gain a variety of skills as they grow plants. They learn to tend plants, explore science and develop relationships and cooperation skills in the process. Helping grow vegetables

often promotes more vegetable consumption among children. Children will need some

garden in town near our house and an even larger vegetable garden in the country.

I had specific assignments depending on my age and manual dexterity. When I was young, I helped plant the onions, potatoes, pumpkin and squash seeds, and snap beans. I am not sure that I ever graduated to planting the tiny carrot seeds.

My clothes, hands and knees were covered in soil by the time we finished. I did that on purpose.

When harvesting time arrived, I told my parents that I would be buying my food when I grew up. I think shelling large tubs of peas led to that comment. They just grinned at me.

Yes, I am eating my own words.

Many years later, I completed the NDSU Extension Master Gardener course. I have

A recently published study that analyzed 22 previous studies from around the world, showed that gardening can improve health. People who gardened showed improvements in mental health, with less depression, anxiety and stress reported.

Gardening reduced body mass index (or BMI) among some gardeners, likely due to increased physical activity and improved nutrition. Gardening also helped people maintain their brain function.

Every summer we do gardening activities with children in the childcare center on campus. I look forward to their delight when their patience and tending is rewarded. They enjoy seeing lettuce, beans and squash plants peeking from the soil.

assistance with planting, so invest in some child-sized equipment, such as small watering cans, trowels and gloves. Many children's books about gardening are available. Visit a library or read along with children's gardening videos found online.

In good springs and bad, snowy ones and warm ones, no matter how the kids come out of the final day of competition in the USA High School Clay Target League's regular season, it's the four weeks in between today's end of the often chilly, windy, and trying eight weeks that make all the difference ahead of the state tournament.

Whether with the first team in southwest Minnesota I helmed nearly a decade ago, or with the six pack of schools I coach along with 75 other

adults now in central North Dakota, the month in between this week's final rounds and the big, multi-day event on Father's Day weekend is where shooters make the most progress.

I first saw it when our bunch of first-season upstarts made their first trip up the highway from Marshall to the awe-inspiring spectacle that was the Minnesota State High School Clay Target League state tournament near Alexandria. Their rounds in the near perfect conditions soared above the averages they had set their first season; only one of which was over 19. There we saw the program's first perfect round of 25, a top ten finish by a young shooter in his division, and radio interviews with the local station providing midway and end-of-day reports as to the scores going up and what was going down. It was a magic we'd capture again and again, even as regular

season averages improved in the following seasons. There was just something about state and the time leading up to it where shooters got better.

Here too now in North Dakota, the eastward jaunt to Horace for the state tourney often brings the same conditions, as our half dozen teams duke it out with the other 60 or so in the state at spring's end. While we've ducked our share of morning thunderstorms and gusty conditions, champions have been crowned, novice shooters post the scores of veterans, and the majority of participants rise to the occasion. At that event, I sit nervously on a cooler or a borrowed camp chair when not at the scoring table, knee bouncing with surging caffeine and hands twitching with residual adrenaline as targets rise and disappear in a black cloud with a snap of a shotgun, and it happens with more regularity up and down

the roster.

You can see the improvement most in those kids that continue their time on the range between the regular season's end and the big event. Those that punch out the remaining rounds on their practice cards, log a few extra targets each week, and exhaust their remaining supply of shells from the season are the ones who make the biggest jump. Those that are shooting nines, or thirteens, or fifteens at this point in the calendar are suddenly dropping a majority of their targets, topping 20, and even setting themselves up for their best rounds, or first perfect rounds in the clutch, just four weeks down the road.

While this spring might be an outlier, there's not as much battling of the elements now. Likely the snow has stopped, winds are a tad calmer and evenings behind the trap house are a bit warmer and this seasonal shift facilitates better shooting, higher numbers of targets crushed, and an overall building of confidence.

Whether at a team-hosted practice night or on their own, change and improvement happens fast. The novices get better and the great become excellent, focusing what they learned and added over the season through the next twenty eight days into a more refined form and an air of confidence they carry into the season's final showdown. Watch and learn, sit back and enjoy the experience, or better yet, be a part of the improvement.

Change happens fast, progress becomes evident, and positivity spreads like wildfire from the home houses to the ones at the big event, and the real preparation for the biggest show in trap shooting begins now ... in our outdoors.



a community cookbook with Growing Together Community Gardens in the Fargo-Moorhead area. This recipe (pronounced "ra-tuh-too-ee") was contributed by Lane Lipetzky and was wellliked by the taste testers.

Kids will recognize the name of this recipe from a popular animated movie of the same name. They might eat more vegetables if they help you grow the ingredients and prepare the recipe.

Ratatouille

- 1 medium eggplant
- 8 Roma tomatoes 1 medium yellow squash
- 1 medium zucchini
- 7 mushrooms
- j cup olive oil
- 1 medium onion

5 garlic cloves 1 red bell pepper 1 yellow bell pepper 8-10 leaves fresh basil S teaspoon dried oregano Fresh parsley Fresh thyme j cup grated Parmesan cheese

Cube or thinly slice eggplant, squash and zucchini; toss in 2 tablespoons olive oil and salt. Roast on a baking sheet at 425 F for 10 minutes. Put the eggplant pan on the middle rack, and the other vegetables on the top rack. Dice onions, peppers and tomatoes. Mince garlic and slice mushrooms. Sautй onion, garlic, mushrooms and peppers in 2 tablespoons olive oil on the stove using a cast iron skillet (or any pan that is oven safe) for five minutes on medium heat. Add tomatoes, oregano and basil to skillet and cook on low to

medium heat until tomatoes form a sauce. Add the roasted eggplant, squash and zucchini to iron skillet and mix in. Bake at 375 F covered for 40 minutes; remove cover and bake for 20 minutes. Remove from oven and top with parsley, thyme, extra basil and grated Parmesan cheese.

Makes six servings. Each serving has 190 calories, 12 grams (g) fat, 5 g protein, 19 g carbohydrate, 5 g fiber and 90 milligrams sodium.



Lady and the Tramp DAKOTA DATEBOOK

May 23, 2022 — On this day, May 23, 1975, Peggy Lee of Jamestown, North Dakota was presented with the Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider Award for her work in the field of motion picture and popular music. Her list of achievements is spectacular; including 12 Grammy nominations as well as an Academy Award nomination for her performance in "Pete Kelly's Blues." But one of her most enduring legacies and a single showcase of her many talents were her contributions to Walt Disney's "Lady and the Tramp."

Working with Sonny Burke, Peggy Lee co-wrote the songs of "Lady and the Tramp," including "The Siamese Cat Song," "He's a Tramp" and the movie's most memorable feature, "Bella Notte," sung at the Italian restaurant where Lady and the Tramp share a plate of spaghetti.


The North Dakota native was also the voice of several of the film's characters such as Darcy, the mother who sings "La La Lu" and Peg, the dog who sings "He's a Tramp." The two devious cats, Si and Am, who sing "The Siamese Cat Song," can also be attributed to the voice of Peggy Lee. She even contributed to the storyline by persuading the writers to let Trusty, the bloodhound, survive.

But Peggy Lee didn't always have a fairytale relationship with the Walt Disney Company. In 1988, she filed suit against Disney, charging breach of contract in the release of a videocassette version of "Lady and the Tramp."

For the original movie, Lee and Sonny Burke had split royalty fees of \$1,000 for the sheet-music and phonograph record rights for the film's musical score. Peggy Lee's 1952 contract also included a clause that denied the company the right to "make phonograph recordings and/or transcriptions for sale to the public." In the 1988 lawsuit, Lee claimed that "transcriptions" should include video recordings; especially considering the \$35 million the Walt Disney Company had made from video sales of the film.

It was "shameful," Peggy Lee said of the company's actions, "shameful that artists can't share financially from the success of their work. That's the only way we can make our living." The jury obviously agreed. In 1991, she was awarded \$2.3 million in damages against the company for selling tapes of the 1955 movie without her permission.



THE CHEESY MASHED POTATOES

Ingredients

- 1 pound red potatoes
- Salt, to taste
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 8 ounces Gruyère cheese, grated
- 8 ounces mozzarella cheese, grated
- Salt, pepper and olive oil, to serve

Directions

Bring a large pot of salted water to boil.

Add potatoes. Cook until potatoes are soft and starting to crack. Remove from the water and peel while still hot. Tip: Use a dry cloth to hold the potatoes.

- Mash the potatoes well with a fork or masher.
- Strain the mashed potatoes in a sieve.

Place the strained potatoes in a pan, add the milk and butter and bring to a simmer, stirring frequently.

When the butter has melted, fold in the heavy cream.

Add the cheeses little by little, alternating between By Yellow Bliss Road portions of Gruyère and mozzarella.

Stir on low heat until all the cheese has been folded in, and continue to cook until texture reaches an elastic consistency.

Serve sprinkled with salt and pepper and drizzled with olive oil. Tip: Aligot can be served on its own, as pre-dessert or as a side dish.

Frosting

Combine the first 3 frosting ingredients in a small saucepan over medium heat and whisk until the mixture has melted. Remove from heat, add powdered sugar and whisk until smooth.

Pour frosting over cookies. Use a knife or spoon to move excess frosting and be sure that each cookie is completely covered.

Let frosting set and serve. Keep your Texas sheet cake cookies in an air tight container at room temperature for up to 3 days.
