



Outdoor Notes:

•Hunters reminded to put identification on tree stands and blinds when set up on N.D. Game & Fish Dept. WMAs.

Lake Sakakawea elevation, Sept. 5: 1,835.21 feet above mean sea level; 21,500 cubic feet per second (CFS) Garrison Dam average daily releases.

Missouri River gauge height, Stanton: River stage, 7.67 feet.

Missouri River gauge height, Washburn: River stage, 10.38 feet.

•N.D. Game & Fish Dept. game wardens: No reports River System.

•Lakes Audubon & Sakakawea, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: East end of Lake Sakakawea slowed but try working slow presentations in 30 to 35 feet. Also try longlining with crankbaits.

·Lakes Audubon & Sakakawea, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Tougher walleye bite on the east end of Lake Sakakawea. Try early morning hours with better success starting to come off of minnows. Work deep for walleye on Lake Audubon with good smallmouth bass success.

•Lake Sakakawea, Dakota Waters Resort, Beulah: Switch to minnows for walleye in deep water, as far down as 40 to 45 feet but plan on keeping anything taken that deep. OK success around the resort with better success along the north shore around the Indian Hills

•Lake Sakakawea, Indian Hills Resort, Garrison: Prior to the windy weekend anglers working around Medicine Stone in 18 to 20 feet with nightcrawlers found nice walleye activity with some success along the beacon, as well. Also try minnows.

·Lake Sakakawea, New Town: Generally slow and scattered walleve success in the Van Hook Arm. Farther west around New Town also slowed.

•Missouri River, Enerbase of Washburn: Not many anglers out with limited reports, including from the Missouri River.

•Missouri River System, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace continues producing catfish from both boat and shore with small walleve success. Best trout and salmon success is at night. Wing walls remain slow. Walleye remain deep along the east end of Lake Sakakawea with nightcrawlers still producing success. Better success is still farther west more so than the east end. Fair

from area lakes or the Missouri to good salmon success on the east end of Lake Sakakawea in 70 feet and deeper yet using white on white flashers and squids. Also try herring. Most activity is around Scoria Bay but look for them to start moving around more and throughout the entire water column with some walleye anglers now finding some.

•McLean Co. area lakes, Cenex of Wilton: East and West Park lakes continue seeing activity using nightcrawlers and a switch starting with minnows. Some activity on Lake Sakakawea, as well.

Hunting:

·Archery deer: Limited movement yet with warm weather.

Doves: Good numbers of birds with warm weather holding them in the state yet. Look for harvested canola or grain fields and nearby water. Birds aren't significantly bunched up yet.

Squeeze more space out of your kitchen

PRAIRIE FARE

"I'm going to get these supercute pig canisters that are half off," my younger daughter texted, along with a link to a

"They are cute!" I replied.

"Where are you going to fit them on your counter?" I thought to myself.

However, I restrained from being the negative influence.

"I think you will need a shelf," I texted back.

"We're thinking about it," she replied.

I am kind of practical.

As we moved our daughter into her first apartment, I carved out some space for food preparation in the fairly small kitchen. I swapped a microwave oven to another part of the kitchen to allow preparation space near the

As long as she and her roommate keep their dishes cleaned and put away, they will have a couple of compact areas to prepare food.

In my younger years, I was not very diligent about doing dishes. Fortunately, they have a dishwasher.

I think she and her roommate will learn much in the coming months as they juggle competing demands on their time.

Life transitions can lead to changes in your daily activities. Whether you are a young adult just starting out or an older adult in the midst of downsizing, you may find yourself living in a smaller

Young adults, in particular, are learning how to manage money for food, gas and entertainment. Many are working part-time and going to post-secondary education.

Current food costs are a concern for all ages. We in the nutrition field often encourage

people to use unit pricing, such as the cost per ounce found on grocery store shelves. For example, a 10-pound bag of rice may cost less per unit than a 1-pound bag, but you may not have the storage space. In other cases, you may get tired of the food before you eat all of it. Perishable food can become unsafe, and you may need to toss it. Therefore, sometimes the smaller package is a better deal even though it may cost a bit more.

When preparing food in a smaller space, be sure to consider your cookware needs. You may need a frying pan, sauce pan, pasta pot, measuring cups and spoons, and a spatula. A slow cooker often comes in handy.

Maximize the space you have. Nest all your frying pans and bowls in a stack. Can you place your toaster on top of vour microwave oven? Could small appliances that are used now and then go in a closet or upper cupboard?

Be cautious about storing things in the oven. Some unsuspecting cook may preheat the oven and discover it is full of dishes or pots and pans. That is not a good discovery to make.

Planning meals is an effective strategy for all of us. When living in a small space, consider planning meals around what is on sale at the grocery store. Buy groceries for the week based on your plan, depending on your storage space availability.

Make leftovers your friend. Consider leftovers as "planned overs" because you can use them in different ways. For example, chili can be eaten with crackers one day. The next day, chili can top a baked potato. Try to make your planned overs into a "different meal" when possible.

Finally, try to wash dishes after each meal or at least daily. A sink full of dishes can

make a small space seem even more cramped.

Here's an easy recipe that makes tasty leftover sandwiches. It can be prepared in a microwave oven or conventional oven.

Microwaveable Meatloaf

1/3 cup rolled oats

1 egg, slightly beaten

1 clove garlic, minced

1/3 cup finely chopped onion 1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce 1/8 teaspoon pepper

1 S pounds lean ground beef 1/4 cup ketchup

Mix oats, egg, garlic, onion and pepper. Crumble ground beef into mixture and blend thoroughly. Press into a 9- by 5-inch loaf pan (microwaveable) and cover loosely with microwavable paper towel. Microwave on high seven minutes, rotate pan and microwave seven more minutes. Rotate once more and microwave five more minutes or until internal temperature reaches 160 degrees Fahrenheit. Spread with ketchup and cover loosely with paper towel. Microwave at medium (50%) until ketchup is heated, two minutes. You also can bake this at 350 degrees for about 60 minutes, until it reaches an internal temperature of 160 F. Spread the ketchup on top about 10 minutes before the end of cooking.

Makes eight servings. Each serving has 140 calories, 4.5 grams (g) fat, 18 g protein, 7 g carbohydrate, 1 g fiber and 140 milligrams sodium.

Sharing Agriculture **DAKOTA DATEBOOK**

In 1947, in the midst of the "red scare," the Cold War and the Bay of Pigs, it is easy to focus on the United States and Russia's power struggles. However, China was also undergoing great upheaval.

Since it had become a republic in 1912, the country had been embattled both internally and externally. The country was mostly unified under the KMT, the nationalist forces. Thereafter, it was caught in power struggles with various warlords, Japan, and other groups, specifically or perhaps, especially—the communist party of China.

This led to the Second Sino-Japanese war, a major Asiatic battle that, after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, was incorporated into World War II. When the war ended, however, the communist forces in the country and the nationalist forces were still at conflict, and they once again resumed the Chinese Civil War. With nationalist forces in the south and communist forces in the north, the battle continued until 1950, when communist China, aided in part by Japan, won out over the Nationalists.

In the midst of all these struggles, the agricultural "scene" was pretty desolate; war-time destruction affected farm tools, draft animals and seed, and the land was left unworked. It was reported that in the Kiangsi province, on the south banks of the Yangtze River, Japanese armies devastated the lands, leveled the villages and forced out the farmers, who

had to wait out this 8-year occupation and the threat of flooding. However, efforts by the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration brought some aid to the region. On this day in 1947, readers of the Bismarck Tribune learned of those ongoing efforts and of the assistance of a "slightlybuilt" young man, Maurice Richards, who was once native to Carrington.

Richards volunteered his time abroad and was working with the Chinese in the south. "Under his tutelage, 65 grease-smudged young Chinese farmers" learned the "modern methods of farming." They were turning overgrown wastelands into rice fields, unfamiliar to native North Dakotans, but also to vegetable and to wheat fields, our own familiar crop.

The UNRRA also contributed 1,136 tractors to the Chinese, helping them eliminate the "centuries-old time-consuming methods of hand plowing their fathers used." They had plowed 2,000 acres of land by the time the article was printed, and could handle the mechanics of a tractor with ease.





A lesson in planting zucchini

As most gardeners are, I am overly excited at planting time. If I have the room and the weather cooperates, I usually plant way more than I can eat and preserve. One never knows what the growing season will bring, and you don't want to be short on vegetables!

One vegetable that I have learned the hard way not to over plant is zucchini.

Zucchini is a member of the Cucurbitaceae or gourd family. This family includes pumpkins, squashes, cucumbers and melons. Zucchini is also called summer squash as it is harvested when it is immature and the skin is very soft.

Zucchini gets a bad reputation because the plants can be so productive. The annual vines of some zucchini varieties can take up a lot of garden space, but there are some varieties with a bushy growth habit that take up less garden space.

Zucchini flowers are bright yellow and large in size. The flowers are either male or female. The male flowers are born on long stalks and the female flowers will have a miniature zucchini at the base of the flower. Depending on the variety, there can be more male flowers than female flowers. Male flowers tend to appear before the female flowers.

Because of the separate male and female flowers, pollinators are needed to produce viable fruit and seed. Misshaped fruit and fruit drop can be a result of poor pollination.

Zucchini flowers are edible. A popular recipe is to drip the flowers in batter and deep fry.

Zucchini should be picked when it is 6 to 8 inches long. It is best, I think, when it is young and small. This requires daily checking to see what is ready to harvest. Zucchini seems like it grows overnight. Miss one day picking and you have zucchini the size of a small dog.

While there are diseases and insects that affect zucchini, the main one in my garden was powdery mildew. I battled the disease for a few years before I invested in resistant varieties. Now, I don't have any issues with powdery mildew. As bad as it is to have too much zucchini, it's worse yet to not have any!

Zucchini used to dominate half of my gardening space. Now, I only have three hills of zucchini and despite the warm, dry weather, I am still eating at least one zucchini a day. Next year, I plan to reduce the number of zucchini hills to one or two.

Ultimately, if you have too many or if they get too big, don't be afraid to chop them up and compost them. I have added a few large zucchinis to my own compost system this summer. Well, I better go check my zucchini, happy gardening!

Often now it seems that summer extends past Labor Day weekend. Where I used to be sprinting around the front yard at the cabin in blue jeans and a sweatshirt, tracking down a lofted spiraling football in my youth, the warmth of the elongated summer has been more conducive to board shorts and tank tops in the sunshine. The fish too hold on to their summer habits, as bluegills remain around the dock, the forest of lake grass stays green and tall in the depths and species such as walleyes and bass hold on to their summer territories too. While it is inevitable that fall and colder conditions will descend on the region and hunting will take the forefront of my outdoor efforts; the shift whether perceived from misty autumn memories of childhood or real - allows for a big finish to summer in conjunction with the holiday.

This weekend the continued stay of the season extended into the turn of the calendar like in more recent years, as my brother, my boys and I went out after crappies and bluegills along the still verdant weedlines, floating minnows under bobbers for the fish that still had their summer activity

levels. Later in the morning, we ripped Jigging Raps along the base of those green breaks, boating a number of nice walleyes, which took as aggressively to the lures as they have at any other time in the warm weather of the last two months.

In a flashback to those summer seasons long ago, framed by the fading sunlight of our Saturday evening, my youngest boated a sunfish that eclipsed his smiling face and reminded me of when I was his age and his size and every bluegill seemed that big and memorable. But that particular huge panfish was the biggest any of us had seen on our high-pressured lake in many years and capped off an exciting run from the dock to the deeper stretches for my son which was a blur of bait going on and bobbers going down for what could be the last such flurry of shallow panfish action, depending on when the first real cold front comes.

The walleyes too provided steady action, and no case of seasonal lock jaw due to lake turnover or frontal fussiness had set in just yet ahead of the change in the seasons. Upon tearing the lure away from them, they'd rocket up and smash it, aggressively jarring the rod in my hand making the hookset easier. The silver

blue bait coloration on the jigging lure was a suggestion of the shiner population in the clear, sandy waters below which served as their primary forage, but undoubtedly they opportunistically feasted on the schools of the season's new perch and bluegills along the weedlines which we located ahead of our late summer success

The final walleye of Sunday evening was a heavy-set 20 incher which eclipsed my personal slot limit and went back into the water. Setting the back hook of the bait into the bottom of its lower lip was like hooking a cinderblock in freefall. Solid headshakes produced some sunset adrenaline surges, and the magnification of the gin-clear water had me thinking it was something bigger before it hit the net. Regardless of its middle-weight status, with the catch and the quick photoand-release to cap the weekend fishing off before Monday's holiday cabin duties was fitting. We motored in toward the fire on shore and the voices and laughs of family and called it a night, knowing that while the days may be limited in what's left of summer, the warmth of this big finish and the activity to come in the field will likely sustain us until next year...in our outdoors.
