

# **DAKOTA RECREATION REPORT**

#### **Outdoor notes:**

•Ice is never completely safe. Avoid areas with vegetation, moving water, pressure ridges, and springs. Check conditions as you go along on the ice and don't move around at night.

•Reminder that most roads and trails closed to hunting if posted on both sides.

•Hunters reminded to put identification on tree stands and blinds when set up on N.D. Game & Fish Dept. WMAs.

•Dec. 10: High Plains Unit duck, coot, and merganser seasons open.

•Dec. 11: Muzzleloader deer season closes.

•Dec. 17: Canada Goose Eastern Zone season closes.

### Fishing:

•Devils Lake elevation, Nov. 29: 1,449.24 feet above mean sea level (MSL).

•Stump Lake elevation: 1,449.2 MSL.

•Lake Sakakawea elevation: 1,832.24 MSL; 15,100 cubic feet per second average (CFS) Garrison Dam daily releases. •N.D. Game & Fish Dept. Dist. game wardens: No reports from east-central area lakes, Devils Lake, or Lake Sakakawea. Occasional walleye at best from Lake Audubon back bays, including Nelson and 3-Mile bays, and Velva Point. Walking access only yet.

•Devils Lake, Ed's Bait Shop, Devils Lake: Some walk-on activity on Lake Washington and north end of 6-Mile Bay. Ice depths vary so test depths and use caution.

•Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Little activity on Devils Lake yet as most anglers wait for better ice. Main lake iced over but no activity.

•Foster County area lakes, Dry Dock, Carrington: No activity yet but look for some walk-on activity with better ice conditions.

•Jamestown Reservoir, Sooper Stop, Jamestown: Some walk-on activity on area lakes but limited early season reports yet.

•Lake Ashtabula, Bayshore, Valley City: No reports.

•Lake Sakakawea, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: Some walk-on activity on the east and north sides of Lake Audubon but use caution with variable ice, including along shorelines. No activity on Lake Sakakawea.

•Lakes Audubon &

Sakakawea, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Lake Audubon iced over but no activity yet. Back bays of the east end of Lake Sakakawea have some ice but not walkable yet. Main bays and lake itself have open water.

\*Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon/Missouri River, Scott's Bait and Tackle, Pick City: Little to no activity on the Missouri River and back bays of Lake Sakakawea.

### Hunting:

•Deer: A little late season rut activity lingering for late season muzzleloader and archery hunters.

•Pheasants: Birds remain in heavy cover and becoming flighty.

•Waterfowl: Good numbers of Canada geese remain along the open water along the east end of Lake Sakakawea. More birds moving onto the open water of the Missouri River, as well.

### Let pain that goes away with rest

Mr. D, a diabetic patient of mine, came into the clinic with exercise induced leg pain. Iniitally the pain would go away if he stopped exercising, but now it was coming on after walking less than a block. He said, "the pain is meaner and lasts longer after I stop."

The diagnosis of Mr. D's condition is claudication, a condition where arterial flow to the legs is blocked. I immediately called the vascular specialist for an urgent appointment. Two weeks later the patient returned to the office after having had his blocked arteries dilated with a balloon followed by the placement of stents to hold them open. Happily, he told me he could once again walk for miles without pain. His vascular doctor had started artery dilating meds, lipid meds, and daily baby aspirin. I renewed my encouragement for Mr. D to eat fewer calories, exercise daily, keep his blood sugars

The narrowing process, called atherosclerosis, can be the result of genetic tendencies, diabetes, smoking, high blood pressure, high blood lipids, and even normal aging. Arteries usually narrow gradually, but atherosclerosis can sometimes trigger a clot and a sudden complete blockage resulting in a sudden, and devastating event. It can occur in coronary arteries of the heart, cerebral arteries of the brain, renal arteries of the kidneys, and peripheral arteries of the legs. And, in general, when it's happening in one, it's happening in all. Narrowing of blood flow can deprive muscles, skin, ligaments, and nerves downstream of precious blood flow and oxygen, resulting in an aching and agonizing hurt that would bring anyone to their knees. When it happens

in the legs, like what happened with Mr. D., the pain symptom is called claudication and the condition is called peripheral artery disease or PAD.

PAD affects five percent of all people over 50, but more than 30 percent of all diabetics in the same age group. There can be a curve ball with diabetes or with aging, as these people sometimes lose feeling in their legs and feet due to nerve destruction, setting them up for PAD without pain. The presenting sign then would be painless sores on the feet which won't heal.

## Lloyd Rigler, Philanthropist DAKOTA DATEBOOK

Lloyd Rigler, an entrepreneur and avid arts philanthropist, passed away on this date in 2003 in his home in California at the age of 88. He made his fortune with a recipe for a meat condiment.

Rigler was born in Lehr in 1915; when he was four, the family moved to Wishek, about 70 miles southwest of Jamestown. He learned about the business world in his parents' general store; he started running his own counter, selling gift items and greeting cards, when he was only eleven.

Rigler packed four years of high school into three so that he could go to work to earn college tuition. In 1933, he headed for Chicago and stayed with relatives while he sold irons for the Edison Co. and shoes for Marshall Fields. Within two years, he had enough money saved up to go to the University of Illinois in Champaign.

After college, Rigler worked in market research, product demonstration, and sales. Then, he went into partnership with Lawrence Deutsch, conducting business as Rigler & Deutsch Food Brokers. In 1948, they happened upon a remarkable entree at a Santa Barbara restaurant owned by the chef, Adolph Rempp. When they learned their meat had been tenderized with Rempp's personal concoction, they asked about the recipe and ended up paying Rempp \$10,000 for it. They made payments of \$100 per month and named it Adolph's Meat Tenderizer.

Over the next 25 years, Rigler and Deutsch acquired fortunes worth millions of dollars and jointly decided to develop the Lloyd E. Rigler – Lawrence E. Deutsch Foundation, which supports social programs and the arts. They were among the founders of the Los Angeles Music Center and the JFK Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. They also supported the Jofrey Ballet, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the City Center of Music and Drama in New York and many more. At the time of his death. Rigler was the vice chairman of the New York City Opera.

Rigler and Deutsch sold their business in 1974, and in 1977, Deutsch died of lung cancer, leaving his estate to the foundation. Rigler now dedicated himself, full time, to supporting the arts. He launched perhaps one of his farthest-reaching legacies in 1994, when he created the Classic Arts Showcase, an eclectic television service that distributes performing arts films to public television stations free of charge.

Rigler and Deutsch also established a legendary collection of rare music, including manuscripts signed by Beethoven, letters by Wagner and a first edition of a Mozart opera; these were tragically lost in a fire that gutted the foundation's Burbank headquarters in 1992.

Rigler was proud of his North Dakota roots and often talked of how good life had been to him during his early years. And, he didn't forget it when he was spending his money.

Of the North Dakota Museum of Art in Grand Forks, he said, "Such quality. I can't believe this kind of quality exists in the arts in North Dakota. I want to support the North Dakota Museum of Art." And he did. Two weeks before he died, he issued a challenge grant of \$12,500 to help the museum gain new donors.

Rigler also gave more than \$100,000 in matching grants to the Northern Plains' Ballet in Bismarck. In his hometown of Wishek, he donated money toward the city hospital and a golf course named for him.

# County Commission approves meteorological towers

### Apex to construct two towers near Washburn

The McLean County Commission approved the planning and zoning committee's recommendation to allow Apex Clean Energy to construct two meteorological towers. The 197-foot towers will be located approximately four and seven miles east of Washburn.

The towers will further track wind resources in the area as plans for the Discovery Wind Project continue. The project was approved by the planning and zoning committee with a 5-1 vote.

"We used public data to prove the project's feasibility," Sean Stocker, Vice President of Development at Apex said. "Then we need to do site specific tests. The towers are going up on land that is already leased for the project by landowners."

Stocker said that the towers will likely be up for two years collecting data. They will come down once operations begin.

"These towers are to measure the resources that are available," Commissioner Steve Cottingham said.

Alan Wagner, who lives near a tower site, said the construction should wait until all the land required for the proposed wind project is secured under lease from landowners.

"We live here for a reason," Wagner said. "We don't want to see this stuff. I ask that the commission deny this request until they [Apex] have all the land under lease."

McLean County States Attorney Ladd Erickson noted that residents were concerned about the larger wind project during the planning and zoning meeting.

"The concerns at the planning and zoning meeting were that we were going to approve turbines with this vote," Erickson said. "It's not been determined if the wind project will go up. This is one step."

The meteorological tower sites are located at SW portion of SW quarter of Section 14, Township 144 N, Range 81 west and SW portion of SW quarter of Section 12, Township 144 N, Range 80 west.

### **DAKOTA GARDENER** Monstera maintenance

I received an early Christmas present this year. I was recently gifted a monstera plant. Now that I own a monstera, I thought I had better do some research to make sure it stays happy in my office and doesn't end up in the compost pile.

Monstera plants are also known as the "Swiss-cheese plant." The plant is native to Central America and can be found outdoors in warmer climates. In our area, they are treated as houseplants.

If you are thinking about getting a monstera, you might need to invest in some additional plant equipment. Monsteras are a vining plant that will need support. A trellis or mosscovered stakes are common support methods. Plants will need to be trained to grow up the supports. Monstera plants can become a massive plant. In their native environment, they can grow 50 feet long and may be considered somewhat invasive. Indoors, they can grow up to 16 feet or more if cared for properly. Therefore, heavier pots are often used with monstera plants to prevent the pot from tipping over.

The main attraction of this plant is the perforated leaves. However, young monstera leaves are heart-shaped and do not have perforations. As the leaves mature, they become deeply lobed and perforated and look more like Swiss-cheese. This design helps the plants withstand heavy rainfall and high winds in their native environment.

Monstera leaves can grow to several feet in width. Because of the large leaf surface, the leaves will need to be cleaned to remove any dust buildup. Use a clean cloth to gently remove dust from the leaves. Monsteras prefer bright indirect light, warm temperatures (70 degrees F) and high humidity. The plant prefers moist soil, so water thoroughly, but let the top portion of the soil dry out in-between watering. Monstera plants can be a financial investment depending on the size and type. Some variegated varieties can be harder to root and will be more expensive.

Monstera plants are in the same family as the peace lily which contains oxalic acid. So, all parts of the plant are poisonous except the fruit. There are specific instructions to follow in order to eat the fruit safely. The fully ripened fruit is usually eaten fresh or used in desserts. Indoor plants will rarely flower and produce fruit.

If you have a gardener or houseplant fanatic who seems to have it all, check to see if they have a monstera plant. If not, you know what to shop for. Or better yet, plan a tropical vacation to see the plant in its native habitat! Happy gardening!



I had the opportunity to take part in a holiday tradition in another state. All the downtown stores with many locally made products stayed open late. They had special sales to launch the holiday season.

I was looking forward to the evening. The stores offered treats including cookies, candy, cocoa and apple cider.

As fate would have it, I twisted my ankle that afternoon. My ankle was swollen.

I limped into two stores and had two treats. Despite the temptations of shopping and food, I wanted to go back to our hotel to ice my throbbing ankle.

As I hobbled to our car, we came upon an opportunity for a ride in a wagon pulled by a tractor. I was able to see the lights, anyway. The ice worked a miracle on my ankle.

The holidays present a wide range of temptations. These tiny tastes can add up quickly. Unfortunately, just 100 extra calories a day can add up to a 10-pound weight gain in a year.

If we keep moderation and balance in mind, we can manage our weight through the temptations during the holidays. Try to get some exercise during the holiday season too.

If you plan to serve or indulge in special treats during the holiday season, which of these tips might work for you?

Use smaller serving spoons. Using smaller serving spoons can decrease the amount of food served by 14%, according to Cornell University researchers.

As you plan menus for the holidays, be sure to fit in all the food groups. Include fruit, vegetables, whole grains, lean protein and low-fat dairy in your menus.

### **Apple Smiles**

1 tablespoon smooth peanut butter, SunButter or other nut butter

1 red or green apple, cored and sliced into eighths

1 lemon, squeezed (or bottled lemon juice)

20 miniature marshmallows

Rinse apples and cut as directed. To prevent browning if you will not be serving the apples immediately, dip the apple slices in lemon juice. Spread peanut butter or nut butter on one side of each apple slice. Place four to eight miniature marshmallows on apple slice (for the "teeth") then top with another apple slice, peanut butter side down. Secure with a toothpick.

Makes four servings. Each serving has 60 calories, 2 grams (g) fat, 1 g protein, 11 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber and 20 milligrams of sodium.

# election coming up

Voters will take to the polls next week to decide on a longanticipated bond referendum that, if passed, would fund an extensive renovation of Washburn Public School.

Constituents of the Washburn Public School district have a little under a week until they make a decision on the school's \$7.9 million bond referendum, which will be up for a vote Dec. 13.

A final public information meeting was set to take place at Washburn Public School Wednesday, with officials from the school and representatives of Consolidated Construction and EngTech giving one last presentation on the election and the proposed building project.

The renovation includes, among other features, a secure entrance to the school, a three-floor elevator and improvements to the auditorium and old gym.

The project is estimated to cost a total of \$7.9 million, which the school board is hoping to pay for through general obligation bonds that would mature over 20 years.

Voting will take place Dec. 13 at Washburn Public School from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Absentee ballots can be obtained by contacting the school office.

# Tell pet scams to scat this holiday season

Second, use the photo of the pet you are offered to conduct a reverse image search online (search "how to do a reverse image search" in your favorite

browser). Scammers copy pet photos from other websites.

Lastly, if you can, shop local. Meeting the breeder in person or touring the facility lets you know it is legitimate. A seller that invents reasons why you can't pick the pet up in person shouldn't be trusted.

(And consider adopting from a rescue, where many future beloved family members are waiting!)
