DAKOTA GARDENER

Battling birds for fruits

I love my cherry shrub—but so do the birds.

As soon as the fruits begin to redden, every bird in the neighborhood flocks to the shrub. The birds aren't picky about the sweetness of the cherries, and half of the fruits are eaten before they ripen.

Once the fruits ripen, the ultimate battle begins.

I chase the birds away and harvest as many of the remaining fruits as I can. The birds fight back, but I act like the fiercest scarecrow, screaming and waving my hands toward them. After my bucket is full, I surrender and let the birds eat the rest of the fruits.

Juneberry is another great shrub. As soon as the berries start to turn blue, the birds attack the delicious fruits. When I lived in Wisconsin, we never thought about battling birds for the fruits. We simply accepted our fate and let the birds eat them.

North Dakotans are different. We fight for our food. In North Dakota, no bird gets a Juneberry until we say so.

It's easy to recommend growing delicious cherries and Juneberries, but some of the greatest shrubs for landscapes produce disgusting fruits.

Start with cranberrybush viburnum. The 10-foot shrub is loaded with white flowers in spring and glossy green foliage all summer. Then comes autumn when something remarkable happens.

Its clusters of fruits begin to redden. Birds are attracted to the bright berries, but the fruits taste absolutely terrible. The birds leave the fruits untouched all winter long.

This makes the cranberrybush viburnum one of the finest shrubs in winter.

While the rest of the landscape is drab and lifeless, the scarlet

berries sparkle in the winter sun. With a blanket of white snow in the background, the impact of this shrub is amazing.

In early spring, when no other food is available, birds will eat the fermented berries. The drunken birds fly high and get high at the same time, just in time for the breeding season to begin.

Another terrible tasting fruit is chokeberry. That's not a very appealing name, but if you ever eat a chokeberry this time of year you will understand how the fruit got its name. Gag me!

Although its fruits in autumn are disgusting, chokeberry has great features for a landscape plant. It thrives in our prairie soil, tolerates drought and is pest free. The plant has white blossoms in spring, deep-green foliage in summer, and its golden-orange leaves in autumn are truly spectacular.

Birds won't touch the dark blue, disgusting chokeberries for months, making this another showy plant for fall and winter.

If you are interested (and have plenty of sugar), the fruits of cranberrybush viburnum and chokeberry can be processed into flavorful jams and juices.

When looking for shrubs in your landscape, consider growing these delicious and disgusting fruits. Both you and the birds may enjoy their flavors and beauty!

Exercise for healthier aging

We all know that exercise is great for our overall health. Exercise is important for our cardiovascular health of course, which is why the American Heart Association recommends 150 minutes of moderate intensity exercise every week. No less importantly, and especially as we get older, another huge benefit of exercise is in fall and injury prevention.

Starting an exercise routine, especially when starting from scratch, can be daunting. The simplest way to get started is to start a timed walking routine. Start with 15 minutes per day. If you can't walk outdoors or on a treadmill, find a long hallway or a large indoor space like a store or mall and just walk. If you are consistent, you will find that week by week you will be able to increase your time ideally up to 30 minutes a day or more. If you have a

friend or family member who shares the same goal, a walking partner will increase your odds of success.

If you have a condition or disability that keeps you from walking, alternatives abound. Some people are much more able to use a stationary bike, or exercise in a pool. Chair exercise or upper body only routines can be found online; use the same principles, starting at 15 minutes and increasing the time gradually.

Already got walking or your alternative down? You can increase the intensity by exercising more briskly or adding some hills or resistance to your routine. And better yet, you can add some strength training to maintain and build muscle. No fancy equipment needed – start with some squats from a sturdy chair; try a 30 second plank. Adding some

variety to your routine is great to keep things interesting and reduce any risk of overuse injury.

There are some great ways to work on exercise in a group if your community has access. Many communities have free group chair exercise or walking groups that you can try out. If able, try a yoga, pilates, or tai chi class. That pesky friend who keeps inviting you to play pickle ball – say “why not” and give it a go! Probably the most important thing to help you be consistent with exercise is to find activities that you actually enjoy doing, so don't be afraid to try something new!

Our exercise abilities and goals might change as we get older, but the benefits of moving our bodies are present at all ages. So get out there and move! You'll be glad you did.

PRAIRIE FARE

How often do you eat seafood?

Let's do an activity. Think back to your food choices during the past week.

How many times did you eat seafood, including any type of fish or shellfish?

Did you have seafood two times, or enjoy about 8 ounces of seafood last week? That's the current recommendation from the latest Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

However, if you are allergic to fish or shellfish, I hope you avoided it completely.

According to most definitions, "seafood" includes any edible marine life, including fresh and saltwater fish, crustaceans (shrimp, lobster) and molluscan shellfish (oysters, scallops, mussels).

I grew up calling marine life such as walleye from Midwestern lakes "fish." It all counts toward the 8-ounce weekly recommendation.

Recently I was at a conference in Rhode Island, so I was right by the Atlantic Ocean. Actually, I was closer to a hurricane than I have ever wanted to be.

I enjoyed a type of seafood every day, including fish and chips, clam chowder, lobster mac and cheese, lobster bisque, sautéed shrimp and cod fish tacos.

I think I am growing fins or a shell.

Growing up in the Midwest, we did not have seafood at home very often. In the summer, we had fresh fish if a fishing expedition was successful. We had tuna noodle hotdish or tuna salad now and then. Fish sticks with mashed potatoes and creamed peas showed up on our school menu on a rotation.

If my mother was preparing food to impress guests, a can of pink salmon would appear on the counter for some sort of recipe.

We all need variety in our diets throughout all of our food choices. Fish and seafood are within the protein group, along with meat, poultry, eggs, beans, peas, lentils, soy products, nuts and seeds.

Seafood provides key nutrients including brain- and heart-healthy omega-3 fats, along with iron, iodine and

choline.

Eating a variety of fish, lean meat and poultry, fruits, vegetables, legumes, whole grains, and healthy beverages may decrease our risk of overweight, decrease our risk for certain types of cancer, and promote bone and heart health.

For pregnant or breastfeeding women, the Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends 8 to 12 ounces of seafood weekly from choices that are lower in mercury.

Mercury is a heavy metal that may contaminate some water from industrial pollution. Too much mercury can affect your kidneys, lungs, heart and digestive system. The good news is that the risk is fairly low. The health risk depends on where the fish were harvested and how much you eat.

Most state game and fish departments provide fish consumption advisories about the mercury content of fish.

Swordfish, shark, king mackerel and marlin are among the fish highest in mercury. Canned light tuna, salmon, shrimp and catfish are among the fish lowest in mercury.

Children should only be fed fish from the "best choices" list provided by the Food and Drug Administration (available at www.fda.gov/food/consumers/advice-about-eating-fish#nutrients).

A serving of fish for an adult is 4 ounces (about the size of the palm of an adult's hand), while a serving size of fish for a child is 1 ounce at age 1 to 3, 2 ounces at age 4 to 7, 3 ounces at age 8 to 10, and 4 ounces for 11 and older.

Fresh seafood can be costly depending on where you live. Try other forms of seafood, including canned and frozen.

Canned fish can be used in patties, with pasta, on salads, in dips and in tacos. To reduce fat and calories, opt for the non-fried options whenever possible.

My "fish and chips" in Rhode Island was not the healthiest choice, by the way. Fried fish is best viewed as a once-in-a-while treat.

Try grilled, broiled or steamed seafood to reduce the

amount of added fat.

Add a little variety to your protein selections. Here's a quick and easy sandwich that pairs well with soup. The NDSU Extension Field to Fork website at www.ag.ndsu.edu/fieldtofork includes a delicious tomato-basil soup with the tomato collection under the "resources" tab.

Tuna Melt
2 (5-ounce) cans chunk light tuna in water, drained

1 medium red onion, chopped
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 tablespoons lemon juice
1/8 teaspoon ground pepper
Salsa to taste
4 slices whole-wheat bread, toasted

1/2 cup finely shredded cheddar cheese

Preheat broiler. Toast bread. Combine tuna, onion, mayonnaise, lemon juice, salsa and pepper in a medium bowl. Spread one-fourth of tuna mixture on each slice of toast; top with cheese. Place on a baking sheet and broil until cheese is bubbling and golden brown, three to five minutes.

Makes four servings. Each serving has 250 calories, 7 grams (g) fat, 32 g protein, 21 g carbohydrate and 400 milligrams sodium.

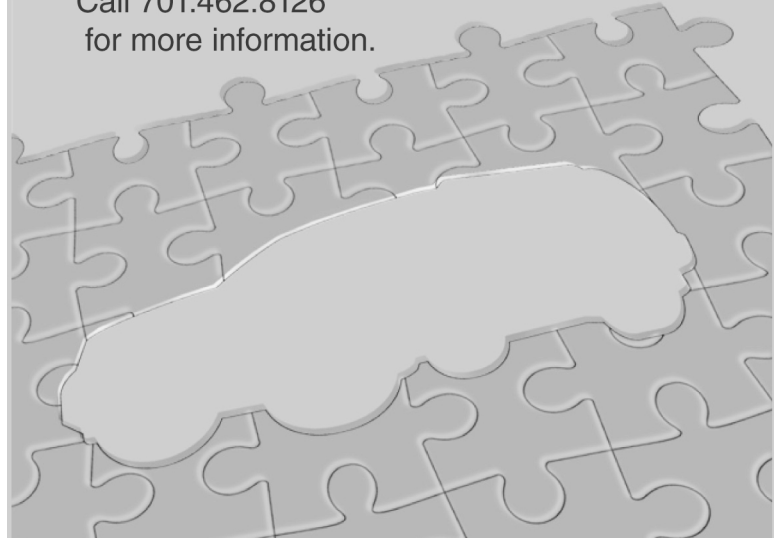

DAKOTA DATEBOOK

Ray Bell and Smokey Bear!

Today, in 1941, the Ward County Independent reported on royalty here in North Dakota.

Formerly King Edward of England and American-bred Mrs. Wallie Simpson, the Duke and Duchess of Windsor were traveling through North Dakota on their way to the Duke's large E. P. Ranch in Alberta. He bought it in 1919, after falling in love with the area. The paper noted the Duke planned his visits for "when the ranch [was] bathed in changing colors of trees and shrubs, and the mountains [were] glistening with new snow." On the way to his land, the train stopped briefly at regular intervals, in Hankinson, Wyndmere, Enderlin, Valley City, Kensal, Carrington, Harvey, Drake, Minot, Kenmare, Bowbells, Flaxton and Portal.

The royal party traveled in three special cars attached to the end of a Soo line train. They had sixty pieces of luggage, and were well-guarded.

The reception in Minot was "necessarily brief, but impressive," the paper reported. Three, maybe four thousand people stood in the October cold on that Sunday, spread over a distance of more than a block along the Soo Railway, waiting for the Duke and Duchess.

When the train stopped, the royal couple stood in the back of the train so people had a chance to see them. Then eight-year-old Carol Weiss of Minot presented them with gifts. The couple received a bouquet of roses from Minot's Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and Cosmopolitan service groups. W. M. Smart, the president of the International Peace Gardens, resident of Minot,

gave two enlarged photos of the Peace Garden. George Valker, who had a Floral Company, gave the Duchess a Gardenia corsage.

Locals also gave personal gifts, like farm woman Mrs. Allan Campbell, who bought the couple flowers from Valker's Floral Company. She wanted to give the Duke and Duchess something, but her own flowers were all frozen. She skipped church so she wouldn't miss seeing the couple, and she presented them the flowers herself, after pushing her way through the crowd. She even talked to the Duke and Duchess.

"[The Duke] is just a common-looking man no better looking than anyone else," she declared, and she said the Duchess was "just nice."

Young Donald Helgerus of Harvey also gave the royal couple a personal gift: he gave them a pheasant he had just killed, since the hunting season had opened. This so pleased the Duke he asked officials of the Soo line to get the name and address of the boy, so he could send a thank-you.

The Duke, a graying man, and his wife, who was overall described in the paper as "much more beautiful than her pictures would indicate," were well-liked and well-received.

In Baltimore, Maryland, the Duchess' hometown, only fifty people waited to see them. North Dakotans made up for this lack of solicitude. The Duke and Duchess were in Minot for all of ten minutes, and many other stops averaged about the same length, but they were greeted throughout North Dakota; shouts of "Hi Wally!" and "Hello, Duke!" followed their path.

Try the outside of Douglas Bay on the north shore or Government Bay to the Riverdale Bluffs on the south side. Some salmon starting to move into the bays, such as Government, Intake, and Scoria bays. Try casting spoons or crankbaits from shore or boats. Salmon seem to be throughout the water column but not many anglers working deep water now.

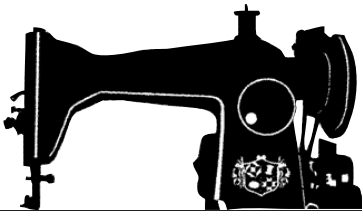

Motorists Watch for Deer

Motorists should watch for deer along roadways this time of year as juvenile animals disperse from their home ranges.

October through early December is the peak period for deer-vehicle accidents. Motorists are advised to slow down and exercise caution after dark to reduce the likelihood of encounters with deer. Most deer-vehicle accidents occur primarily at dawn and dusk

when deer are most often moving around.

Motorists should be aware of warning signs signaling deer are in the area. When you see one deer cross the road, look for a second or third deer to follow. Also, pay attention on roadways posted with Deer Crossing Area caution signs.

Deer - vehicle accidents are at times unavoidable. If an accident does happen, law enforcement authorities

do not have to be notified if only the vehicle is damaged. However, if the accident involves personal injury or other property damage, then it must be reported.

In addition, a permit is required before taking possession of roadkilled deer. Permits are free and available from game wardens and local law enforcement.

A few precautions can minimize chances of injury

or property damage in a deer-vehicle crash:

Always wear your seat belt. Don't swerve or take the ditch to avoid hitting a deer. Try to brake as much as possible and stay on the roadway. Don't lose control of your vehicle or slam into something else to miss the deer. You risk less injury by hitting the deer.

If you spot deer ahead, slow down immediately and honk your horn.

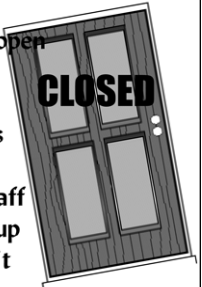

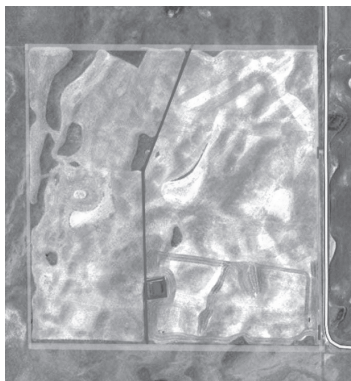

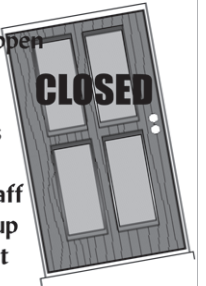

THE FILM PURSUIT

X marks the spot

It was the summer of 2008, and the theatre was packed. It was an experience that I'll never forget as I was about to be introduced to who would become my all-time favorite character in movies. That character is none other than the man in the fedora himself, Dr. Henry Jones Jr. or as he prefers to be called: "Indiana (Indy) Jones." With great performances by Harrison Ford as the hero, the unforgettable stories and treasures, memorable side characters, brilliant musical scores, and some of the greatest action sequences ever put to film, there's very little not to love when it comes to the "Indiana Jones" film series. There are five films in the series and let's rank them from worst to best.

5. "Indiana Jones and the Dial of Destiny" (2023)

In the most recent film, it turns out our aged hero has one last adventure to make when he joins his goddaughter Helena to find a mysterious dial

that legend says has the power to alter time. I found the film to have many strengths, but overall, it's a perfectly decent movie. Unfortunately, there is a lot left to be desired as the movie runs on for far too long and I really missed some of the tongue-in-cheek moments that were done so cleverly in the films that came before it.

4. "Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull" (2008)

The biggest downfall of the fourth film is the out of this world ending that feels inconsistent with the rest of the series. Up until the ending, I really loved the movie. Returning to the role of Marion Ravenwood from "Raiders of the Lost Ark," is Karen Allen; She provides great chemistry with Harrison Ford once again. There are lots of exciting action scenes with interesting enough side characters to make this an enjoyable ride.

3. "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom" (1984)

In the second film of the franchise, Dr. Jones is joined by singer Willie Scott and a young boy named Short Round. After escaping a deadly shootout in a Shanghai nightclub, their plane crash lands in India and they meet a group of desperate villagers who beg the trio to rescue their children who were forced into slavery from an evil cult. What I admire most about this film is that it is very gutsy, and the filmmakers weren't afraid to try something new. This is a much darker story that isn't afraid to be different from what was done in the first installment. Instead of the traditional beginning, middle and end, this film feels more like a two-part story where part one is how the characters got into the temple of doom and part two is all about our heroes trying to rescue the children and escape the haunting temple.

2. "Raiders of the Lost Ark" (1981)

The very first film in the series is still an all-time classic. The opening scene where our hero is looking for a Golden Idol is filled with lots of suspense and does a sensational job of introducing Indiana to the audience for the first time. Indy is looking for the legendary Ark of the Covenant, but he is in a race to find it before the Nazis do. This leads to many exciting set pieces including a thrilling chase where Indy tries to hijack the truck that the Nazis are holding the Ark in. Harrison Ford brings in so much charm and charisma to the role of Indy. Karen Allen makes her first appearance as Jones' love interest, Marion Ravenwood, and instantly has perfect chemistry with Harrison Ford and every romantic scene works perfectly throughout the runtime.

1. "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" (1989)

Dr. Jones is in for the

adventure of a lifetime as he is on the search for the Holy Grail and once again faces the fiendish Nazis. This time he is joined by his father brilliantly played by Sean Connery. One of my favorite aspects of this movie franchise is how in each adventure Jones gains something much greater than treasure. This film has Indy reconcile what was once a nonexistent relationship between him and his father, and this shows how important a good Father-Son relationship is. The climactic scene of the characters trying to get to the holy grail is genius storytelling. For Indiana to get to the room where the Grail is stored, he must literally walk by faith and not by sight to do so, creating a unique challenge for the hero. With so many wonderful themes, great comedic relief, and phenomenal action set pieces, I consider this to be my all-time favorite movie and I find myself revisiting it on a consistent basis.
